

June 1909- Jan 1910. Transitman and building inspector for Westinghouse, Church, Kerr & Co. on \$600,000 job for the C & O Ry at Huntington, W. Va
Jan. 10- June 1910, Junior Architect in the office of the Supervising Architect, Washington, D.C.
June 10 to Oct 10. Draftsman for Spencer and Powers, Chicago, Ill.

Oct 1910 to Jan 1914, Instructor in Art and Architecture at the Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore.


