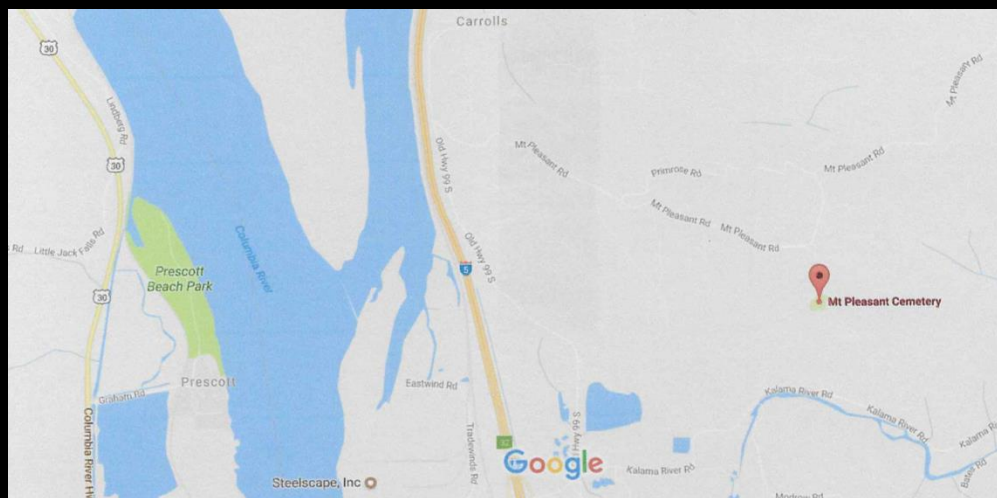
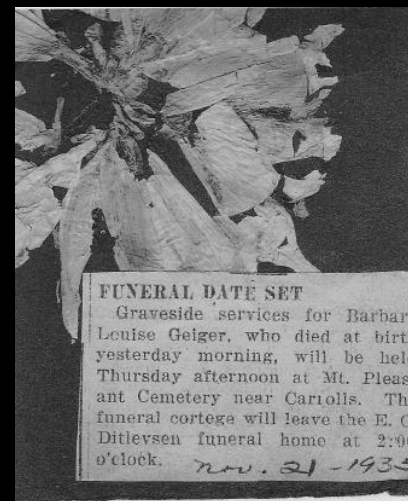
Miss Sarah (Sallie) Ivie, county auditor, said 108 voters favored the proposal, while only 10 voted against it.

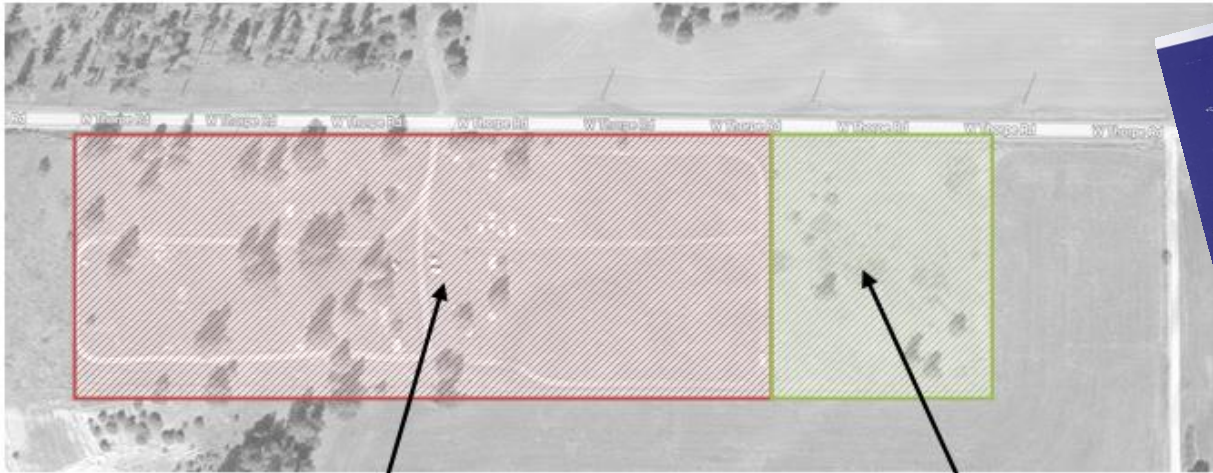




# Spokane County Assessor Map

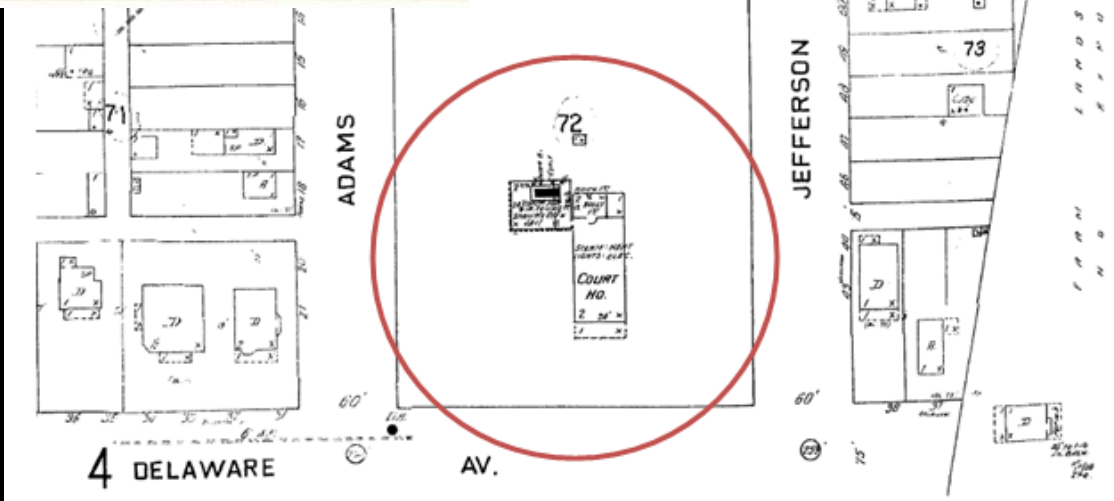




**COURTHOUSE AT REPUBLIC BURNS**

REPUBLIC, Saturday, Feb. 16—(U. P.)—A sudden fire of undetermined origin destroyed Ferry County courthouse here early today.

When the fire department arrived the interior of a brick annex, built in 1907, housing the clerks, county engineer and jail, was in flames. Offices of the auditor, treasurer, assessor, county superintendent and county judge, in a nearby building, were also destroyed. Vaults were intact. The county carried \$23,000 insurance.



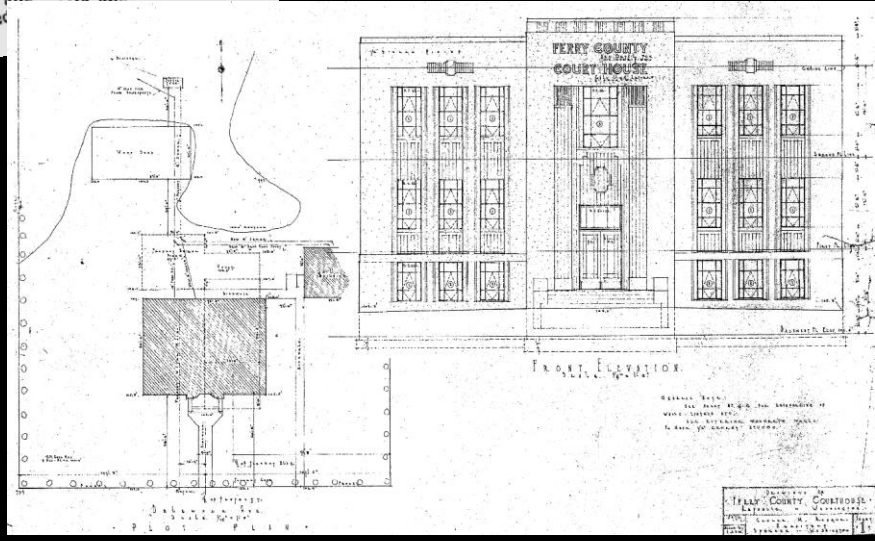
Sanborn Fire Insurance Map – Showing location of original courthouse Republic Sept. 1908-July 1932, Sheet 2

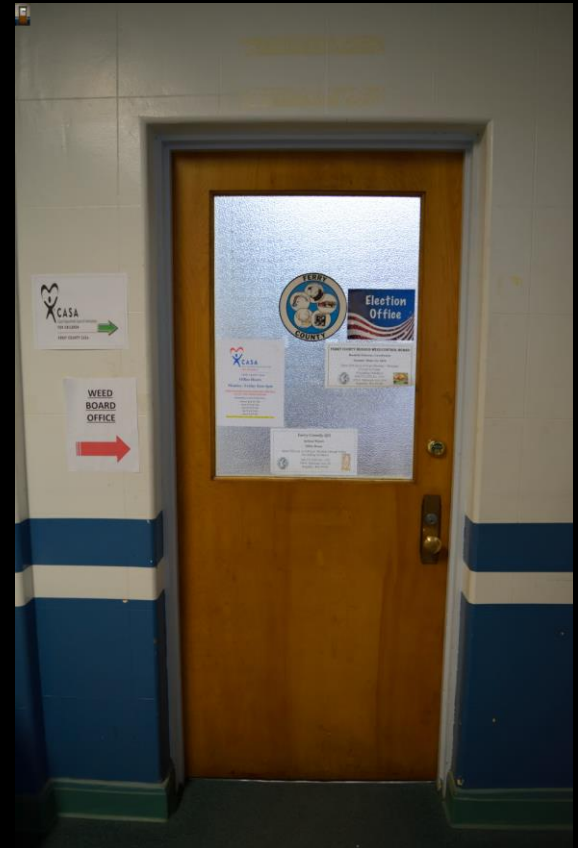


## New Ferry County Courthouse Opens

F1= Fort Okanogan (Pacific Fur Co.) 1811 site

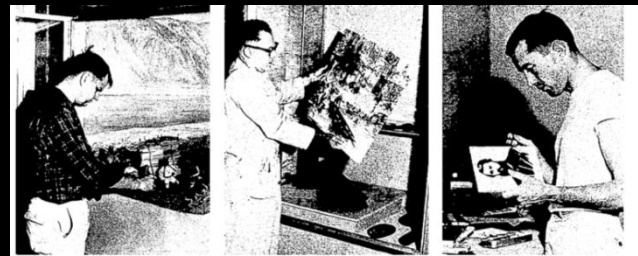

### THIS CREW HAS BIG JOB

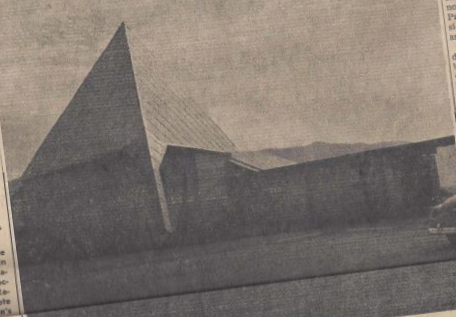

The new Fort Okanogan Historical Museum near Brewster will be dedicated on Saturday, August 27, with Governor Albert D. Rosellini delivering the dedication address, according to announcement made by the State Parks and Recreation Commission, the state agency building and operating the museum.

Master of ceremonies at the dedication will be Clair V. Greeley, Omak High School band leader. He will introduce the speakers and Frank Emert, Omak, chairman of the Fort Okanogan Historical Committee, will introduce special guests.

Brief talks will be given by the Omak High School band playing "The Star Spangled Banner" and "God Save the Queen". The invocation will be given by Father George H. Morbeck, Sacred Heart Parish, Brewster.

Brief talks will be given by Mr. R. H. Cheshire, Winnipeg, Canada, representing the Hudson's Bay Company and by Mr. Geoffrey Jackson, Seattle, British Consul-General.

### T. A. Hermans Built Museum

Fort Okanogan Historical Museum is an \$80,000 building and was built by the Soap Label contracting firm, Hansen and Hermans.

T. A. Hermans, one of the partners in the firm, personally supervised the job and did a superb job of the actual work.

Hermans said that "I had a great deal of fun doing this job. I don't recall another job which was as interesting to me as this. It was of great personal satisfaction to have built this museum and I shall feel that I have left a part of me here as I take my leave."

Hermans added that he was only fully enjoyed working on the museum, but that he was also happy to say the museum he received from his acquaintance in Brewster and the negotiations with the people working with him were wonderful.

In the concluding ribbon-cutting ceremony, Marie Gorr, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Gorr, Brewster, and Mr. Vande Gorr, Rosellini, who will present a special invitation to Governor Rosellini, who will unlock the museum doors.

Marie Carah, daughter of J. and Mrs. Ray Carah, and I. K. Klemm, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Sibley, Bridgeport State Park, District Ranger, will distribute dedication plates by local officials, will direct by local officials, will be in charge of parking cars at the site.

Nearly Brewster is having a day-long celebration in connection with the dedication, from 6 a. m. to 10 p. m. on Saturday morning, sponsored by the Brewster Active Club.

The next event will be a historical parade, in which the historical committee and other groups are invited to participate in the parade. This dedication party will be held at the museum.

### The Fort Okanogan Historical Museum

The Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission acquired land at the Fort Okanogan site in 1951. The first archaeological work began in 1952, with the Commission cooperating with the National Park Service. Further work was done in 1957, the Commission and the University of Washington cooperating. Interpretive work by the Commission was begun shortly thereafter, eliminated in 1960 by completion, on the 49-acre tract, of the Fort Okanogan Historical Museum. The museum tells the story of the fur trade, the region, and the Columbia and Okanogan rivers on which the trading posts were located.

## PLANS COMPLETE TO FINANCE NEW DOWNTOWN WORK

### ANOTHER SKYSCRAPER

Construction Will Begin at Once, W. D. Comer Announces; Sixth and Union Site Chosen for Building.

SEATTLE is assured its \$2,300,000, twenty-story athletic clubhouse to be erected on the southeast corner of Sixth Avenue and Union street. This assurance came today with the announcement by W. D. Comer, president of the Washington Athletic Club board, that financing arrangements had been completed and that construction work can be started at once.



Architect's drawing of the proposed \$2,300,000 athletic club to be built at Sixth Avenue and Union Street. It will be twenty stories high, with the main entrance on the Sixth Avenue side. Store rooms will occupy the Union Street side.

The announcement of the trust agreement was officially communicated to the board of the Seattle Trust Company.

Twenty stories will be twenty stories high with the main club store rooms on the sixth Avenue side and one-half will occupy the Union Street side. The ground floor is devoted to the social activities of the club; four and one-half floors will contain the remaining club equipment and the remaining top half floors will be bachelor rooms for able permanent homes on Sixth Avenue. The site of the building has a frontage of 115 feet on Union Street and 120 feet on the Sixth Avenue side.

## Old Buildings Coming Down!

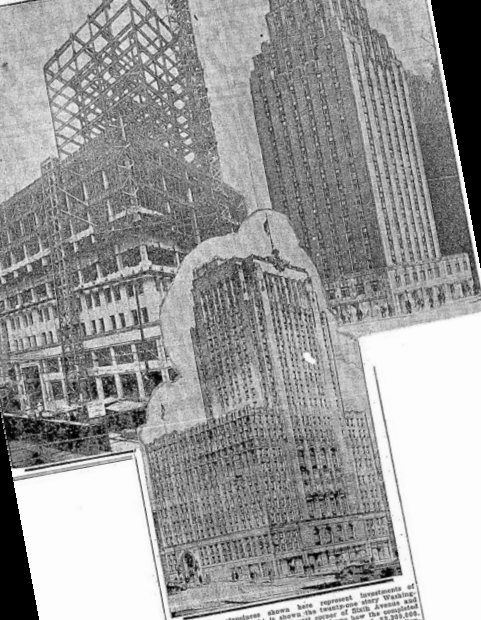
Off with the old and on with the new!

- 5. Interest in the new club continues to increase. The Membership Committee reports addition of a number of new members, substantial business and professional men bringing total membership well over 3,100.
- 6. There will be no handsomer or more stately building in Seattle. Every detail of construction, equipment and operation represents months of arduous and unselfish work by trustees and committee members.
- 7. Competent management will be provided and no detail overlooked for the entertainment, comfort and physical betterment of members.
- 8. Especial attention is given to planning the finest Bath and Physio-Therapy Department in the Pacific Northwest. 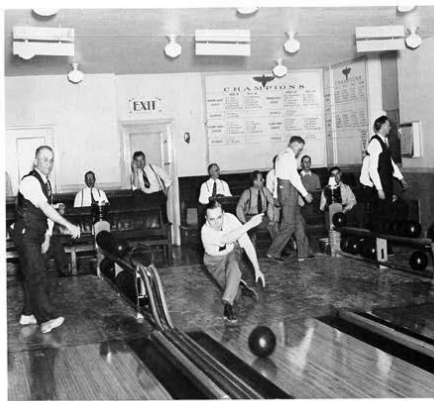

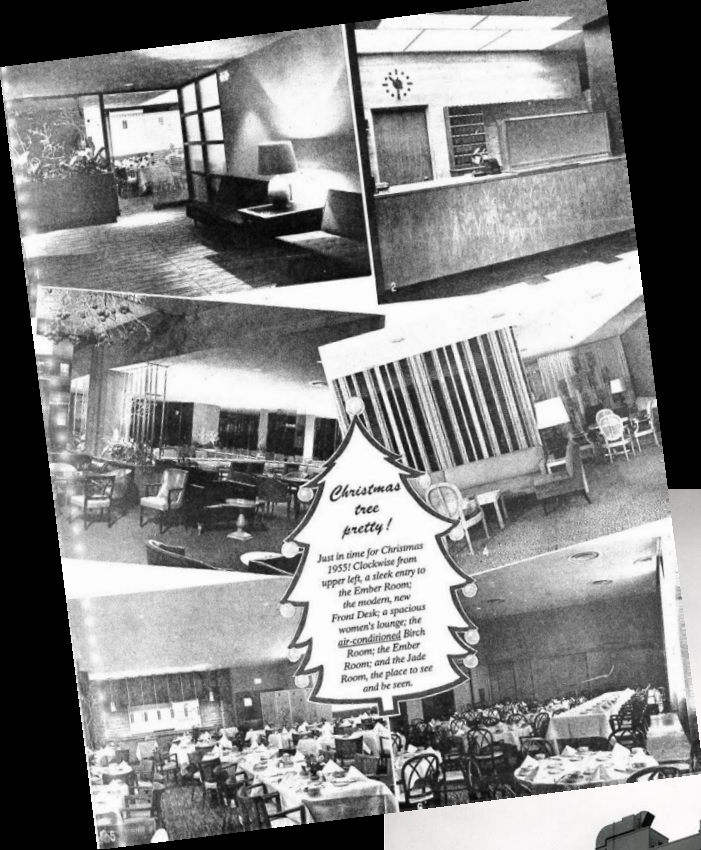
