












Rest Area Map - 1967

Stop and Rest For Safety

Washington's first modern rest area on an Interstate highway was opened June 27 on the northbound lanes of Interstate 5 near Custer. The new stopoff point provides parking for 29 cars or pickups. 














Artist's sketch depicts Columbia Building as it will appear following exterior remodeling of bottom two


