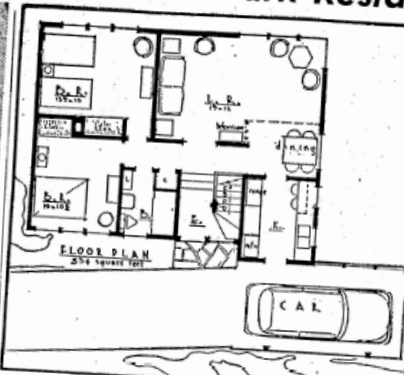
Compactness Is Major Feature in Lake Forest Park Residence



OPEN HOUSE: Economy is expressed in the house featured today by compact planning and by using simple materials well. Ira E. Cummings, architect, and the I. K. Strathy Company have worked together to arrange on two levels comfortable areas encompassing a panoramic view of mountains, valleys and lakes. Open-house hours today are from 1 to 5 p. m., at 17847 49th Place N.E. in Lake Forest Park. Drive out Bothell Way, turn left on the Lake Forest Park Road, right on 178th Northeast, then follow the signs.

frame the view. This down-side lot, so typical of Northwest property made special demands on the architect, Ira E. Cummings, and the I. K. Strathy Construction Company. The plan features walls of siding on the street side for privacy with great window areas opening to the picturesque view.

The plan, although compact is a good example of what can be arranged on a sloping lot where two levels may be used comfortably when needed. The open stairway is an inviting approach to the lower level, where expandable features include a future bedroom and recreation space.



From the entry we step into the living room thoughtfully arranged for quiet, comfort and view. Wall areas allow several conversational groupings. There are no disturbing through-traffic lanes and the windows are large to bring in the sun. The dining area is defined by a free-standing post motif.

On the upper level two bedrooms are equipped with wardrobes for maximum storage space. High strip windows allow flexible furniture arrangements in minimum-sized bedrooms.

Throughout the house pastel colors have been used to make the home appear more spacious. The lovely vistas of the ocean and interesting picture patterns, and the soft pastel shades blend beautifully with the green trees outside.

The exterior appearance features a broad fascia with wide overhanging eaves for sunshades. There are vertical and horizontal applications of siding in natural and stained finishes to form interesting variations in texture and pattern.

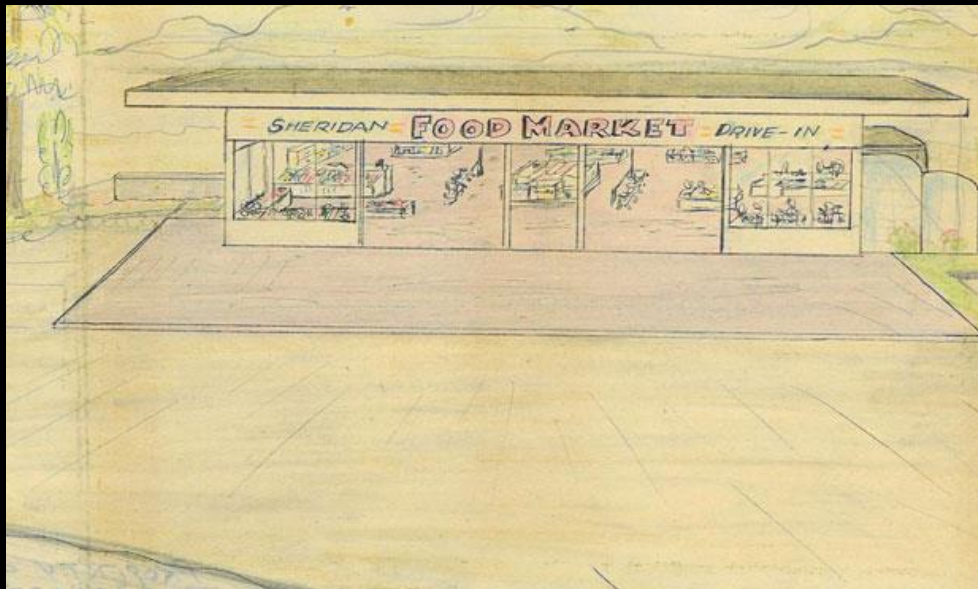
The carport with its spayed post detail gives an expansive look to the house and is conveniently reached from the entry or through the kitchen.

Gunman Flees Under Fire In Robbery Try

A gunman was foiled Sunday evening in an attempt to rob the Sheridan Market, E. 155th St. and Bothell Way, and fled under gunfire.

Edward J. **Jahoda**, the store owner, told Sheriff's deputies the man entered, pointed a .32 caliber revolver at him and demanded cash.

JAHODA TOLD the gunman he was "covered" by another man outside the market and the bandit ran from the store to a waiting automobile, occupied by another man.

Jahoda said he fired three shots at the car, as it sped north on Bothell Way, and may have wounded one of the men in the auto. The gunman was about 35 and wore a red baseball cap.

Plucky Grocer Is A Handful for Robbers

Gun-toting holdup men have tried E. J. **Jahoda** a dozen times. And each time he has sent them away frustrated and empty-handed, except for Monday night, when a man with a shotgun got away with \$100.

Even this was no bargain. **Jahoda** took the shotgun away from the holdup man. King County detectives who are now taking fingerprints off the weapon say it's worth a good deal more than \$100.

A young man walked into **Jahoda's** Sheridan Beach Market, 15348 NE Bothell Way, at 8:30 p.m., pointed the double-barreled gun at the 65-year-old grocer's head and announced, "I'll let you have it."

Jahoda, a .38 revolver tucked in his waist under an apron, replied: "Go ahead but how are you going to get the safe open? Shout 'but you're going to make an awful lot of noise and attract some people.'"

Jahoda surrendered a few bills from the till and slammed it shut. He also touched off one of his many signaling devices. His daughter, Marilyn, heard the alarm and, out of sight of the holdup man, slipped into a back room and telephoned officers.

The gunman had spotted some silver in the cash register and ordered **Jahoda** to reopen it. Eyering **Jahoda** carefully for a chance to grab the shotgun, **Jahoda** complied.

As the man shifted the gun to stull the silver into a pocket, **Jahoda** swiftly clinched the gun. The ruggedly-built grocer wrenched the gun free. The robber fled with **Jahoda** trying to fire.

"It was a different kind of shotgun than I'd seen. I couldn't get it to work," **Jahoda** said.

looking man approaching the door, slammed it and locked it. The holdup man smashed a window and threw a gun inside, shouting **Jahoda** open up. He refused, all the while trying to get into his position to use his own gun.

It was a standoff. The would-be robber finally headed for his car, calling out over his shoulder: "Okay. You've got more guts than the average guy."

The holdup men also tried to grab **Jahoda** when he was running. **Jahoda** was the manager of the Tradewell Laundromat store 23 years ago. All failed, **Jahoda** by talking, delaying, offering a barrage of excuses why he couldn't open the safe or the till, managed to route them.

On one occasion, **Jahoda** fired his .38 at a fleeing robber. He thought he had missed. Months later, Snohomish County officers arrested a seven-man gang, one with a long, sear-shaped scar the length of his temple. He confessed to trying to rob **Jahoda**.

"I missed, alright, but not by much," the grocer said.

For holdup men with unusual bravado, **Jahoda** warned that he has (1) several alarm systems at work day and night, (2) special locks for doors, cash register and safe, (3) two unfriendly Shepherds that guard the grounds and (4) some top security measures he won't disclose.

"Let them find out for themselves," **Jahoda** said.

Two Robbers Are Foiled By Stubborn Register

Two robbers burst into a North End grocery store in a show of bravado last night, turned and ran when they couldn't open a cash register.

The robbers fumbled with the till for a few minutes, then panicked and ran, **Jahoda** said.

Edward **Jahoda**, owner of the Sheridan Market, 15348 Bothell Way NE, said one man fired his .22-caliber rifle from the hip to emphasize his seriousness.

Jahoda told them he couldn't open the register, then ducked beneath a counter.

Robber Wounds Market Owner

Edward **Jahoda**, 62, owner of the Sheridan Market at 15348 Bothell Way, was shot last night by one of two robbers who held up the store.

He was found wounded in the market's parking lot and

deputy sheriffs presumed he may have followed the holdup men out of the establishment.

He has gunshot wounds in the lower back and one leg and was taken to Swedish

Hospital.

Officers could not question him immediately to determine how much was taken in the robbery and what happened. Witnesses told deputies there had been a holdup.

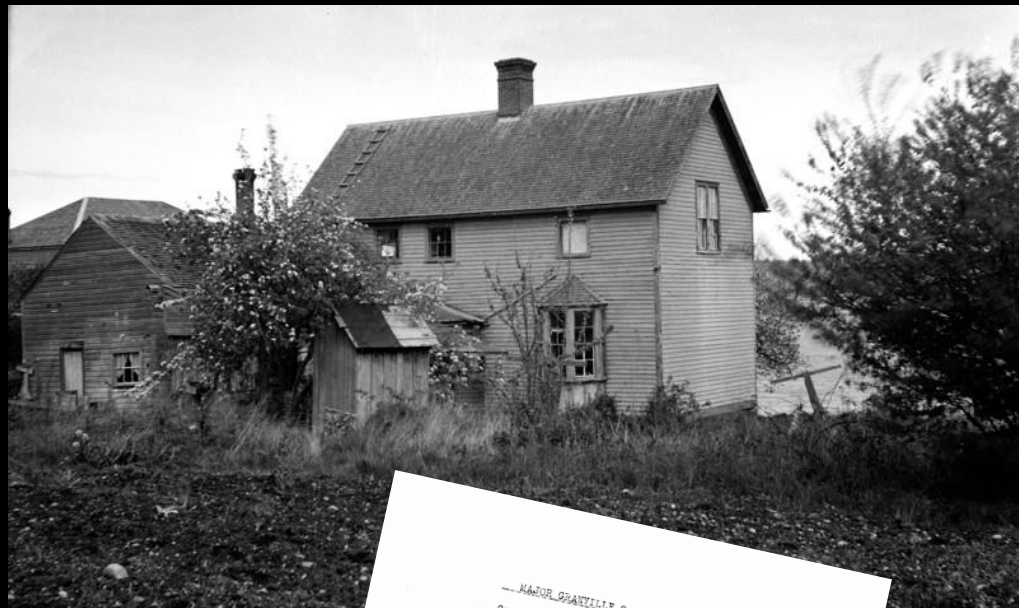

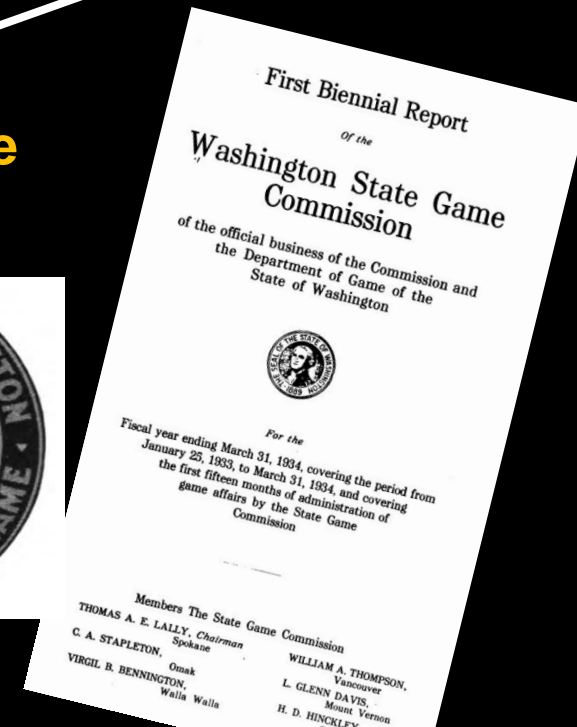

A view of the ten circular rearing ponds in Seward Park, Seattle park system, now operated by the Department of Game on subsidy from the Seattle Park Board. These ten ponds are fine examples of what cooperation can do. Seattle Outdoor Sports Council raised the initial moneys through a huge dance honoring the mayor-elect. These funds, augmented by the park board, brought WPA moneys and labor into action. Operation of the completed plant was started in 1935. Department of Game biologist is conducting food experiments in these ponds. Steelhead, rainbow and cutthroat are being reared here for liberation in Lake Washington and neighboring streams.

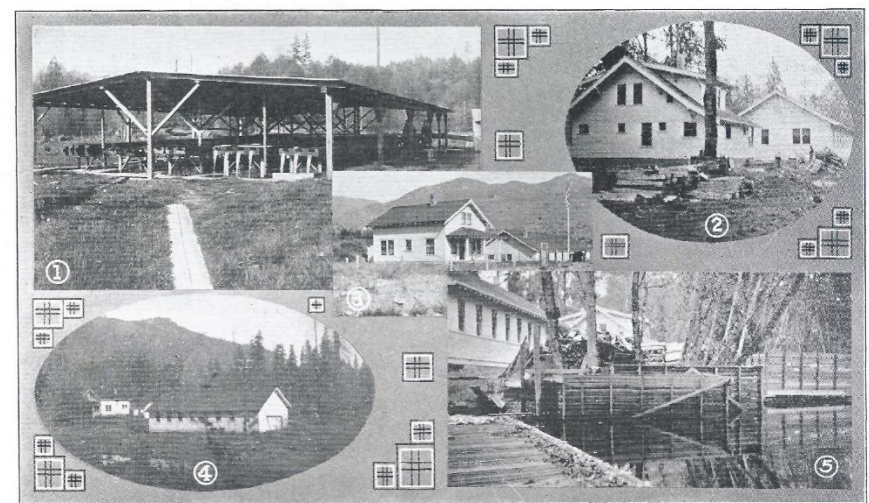

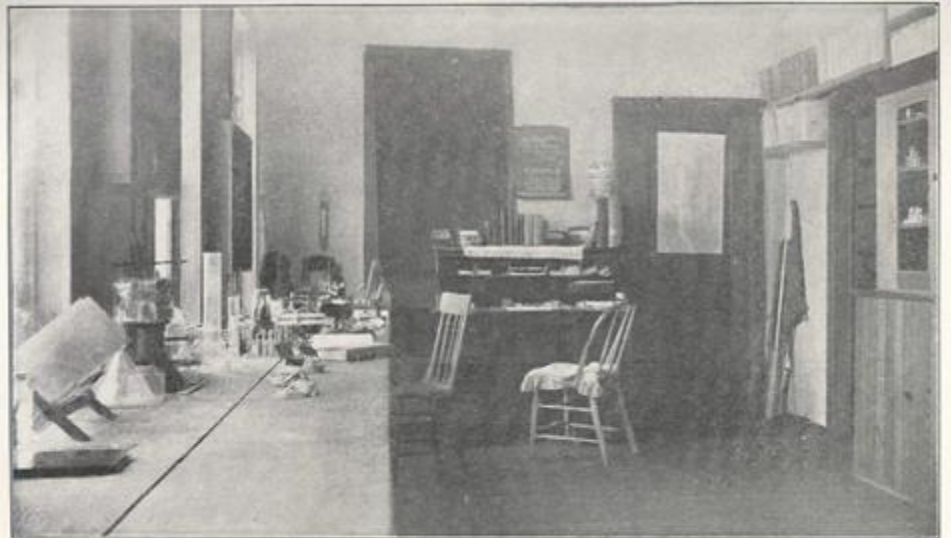

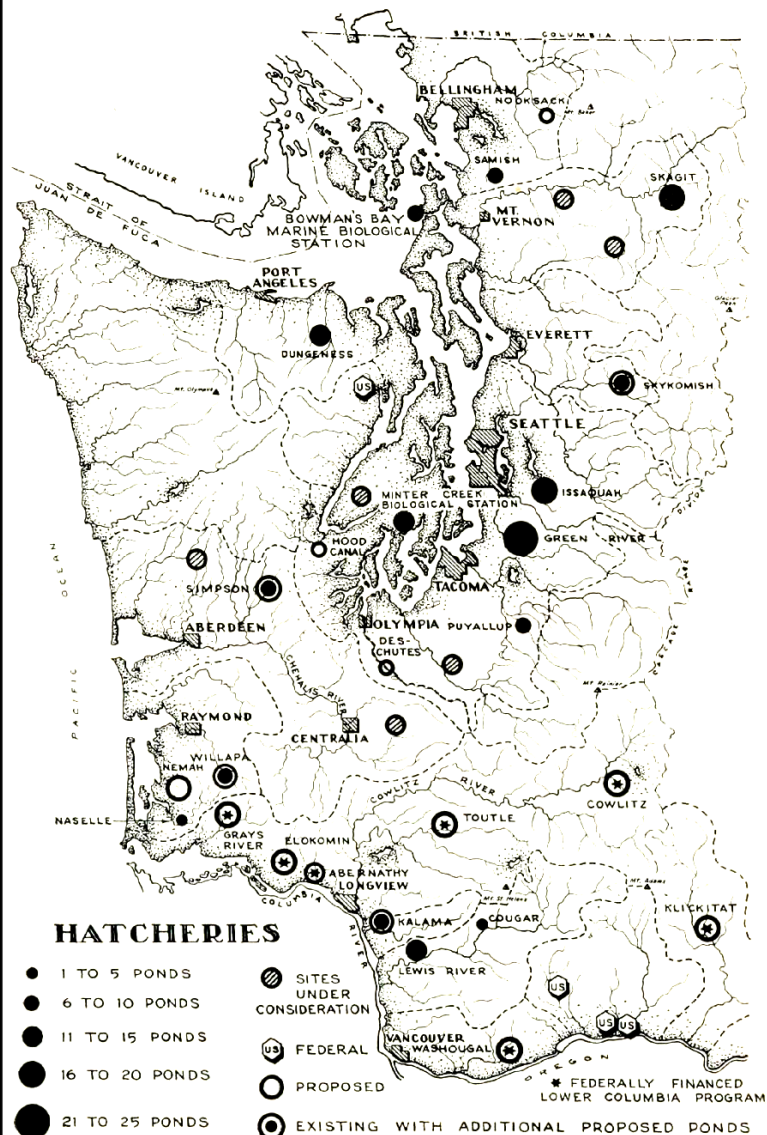

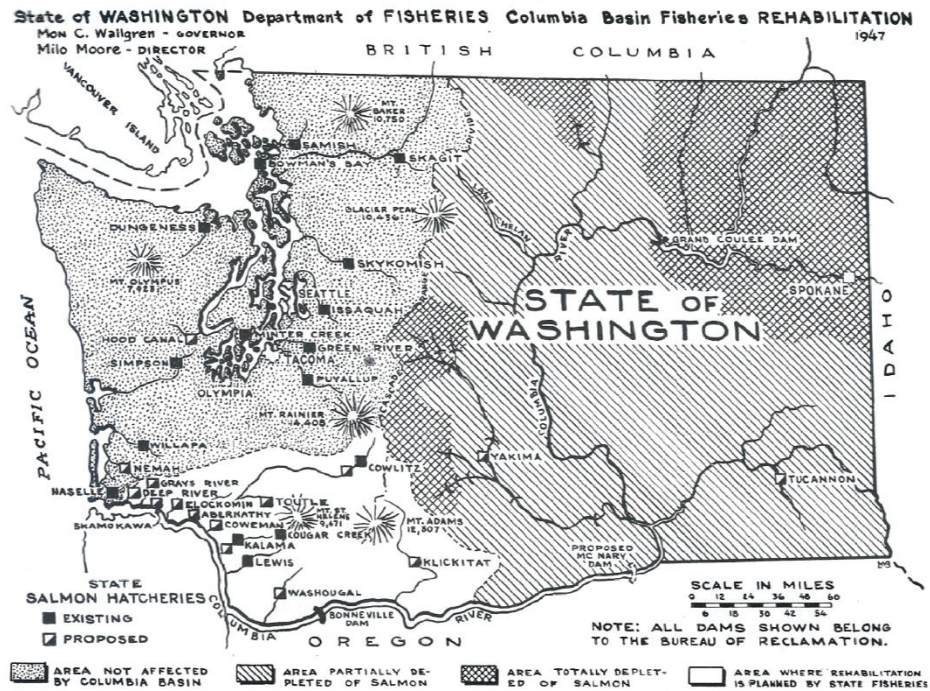

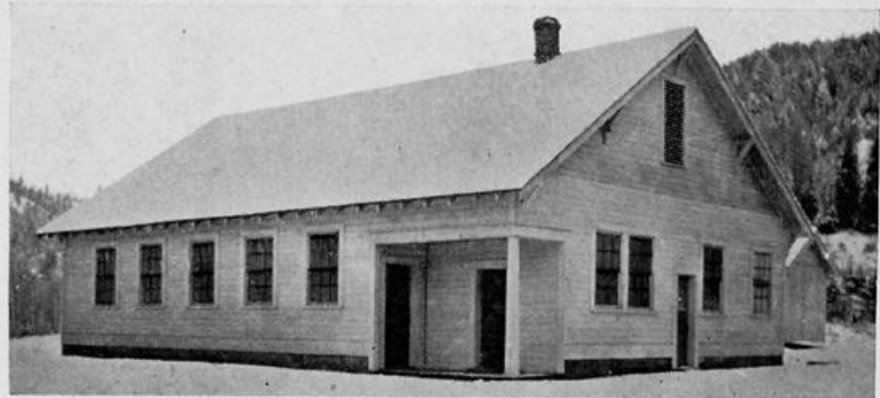
Washington Salmon Hatchery Locations and Sites

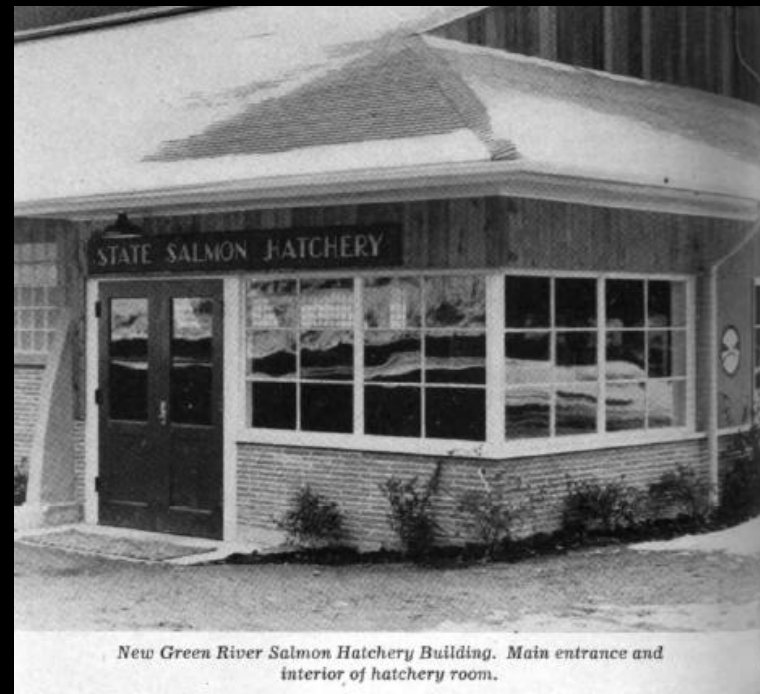

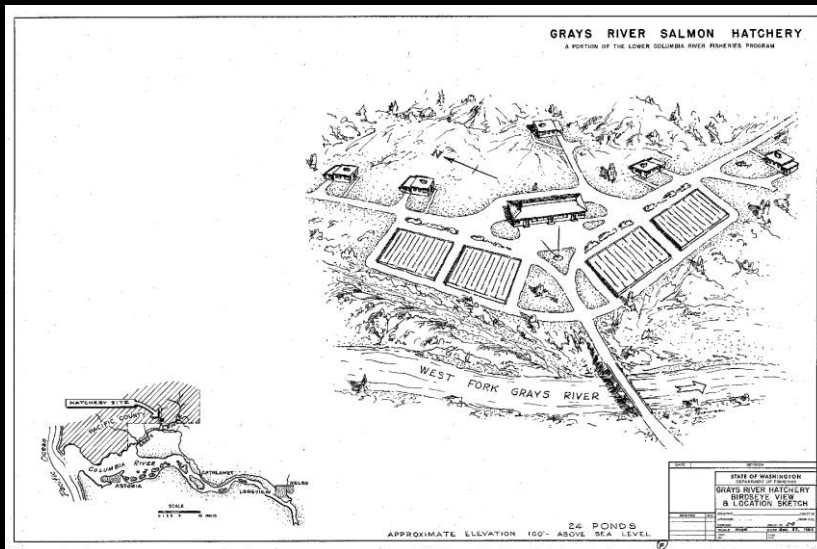

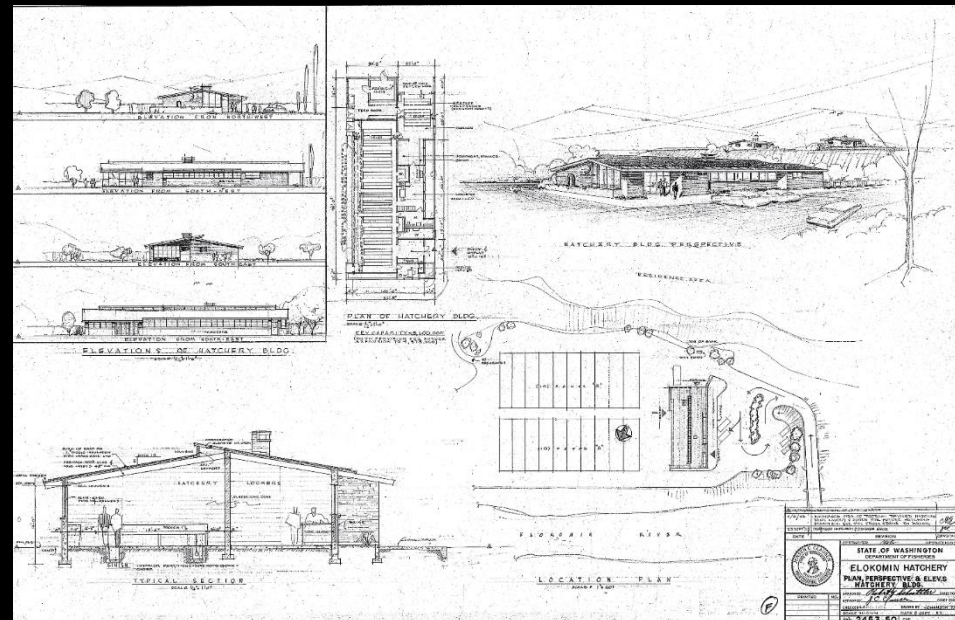

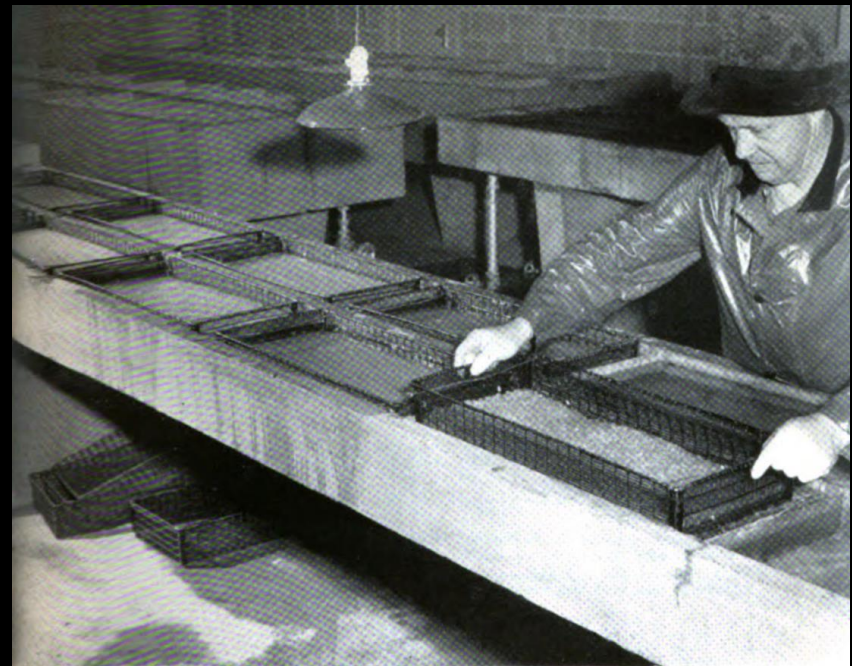
Site Plan for Grays River Hatchery - 1961

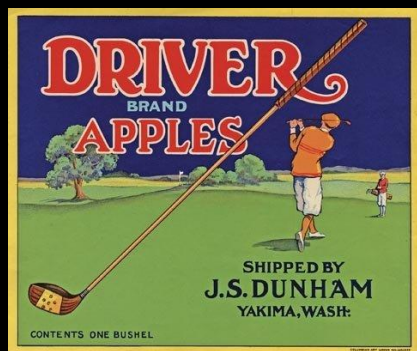
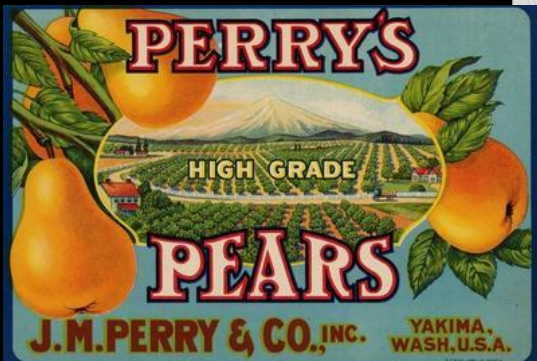


Fruit and Produce Row Historic District
