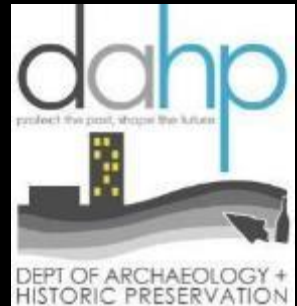

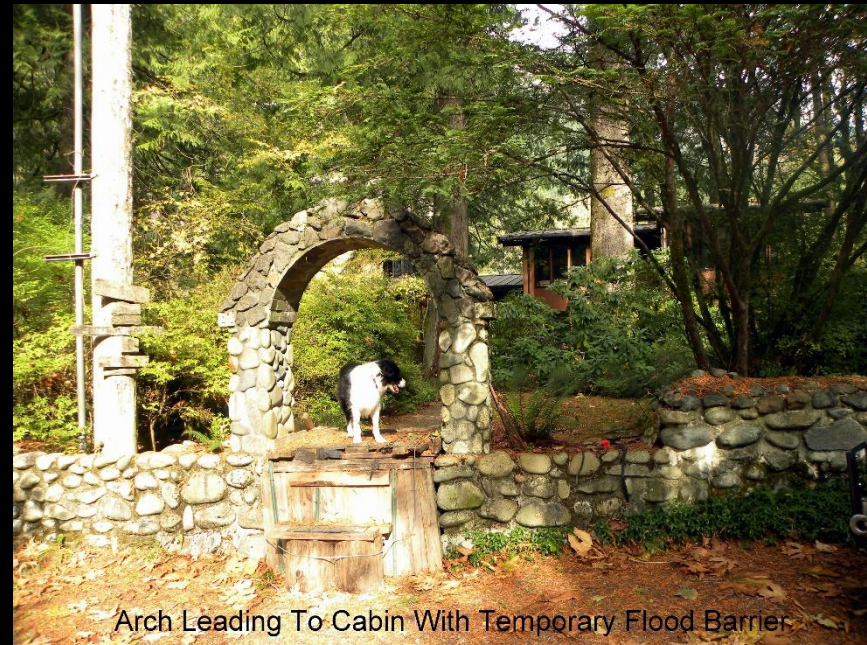

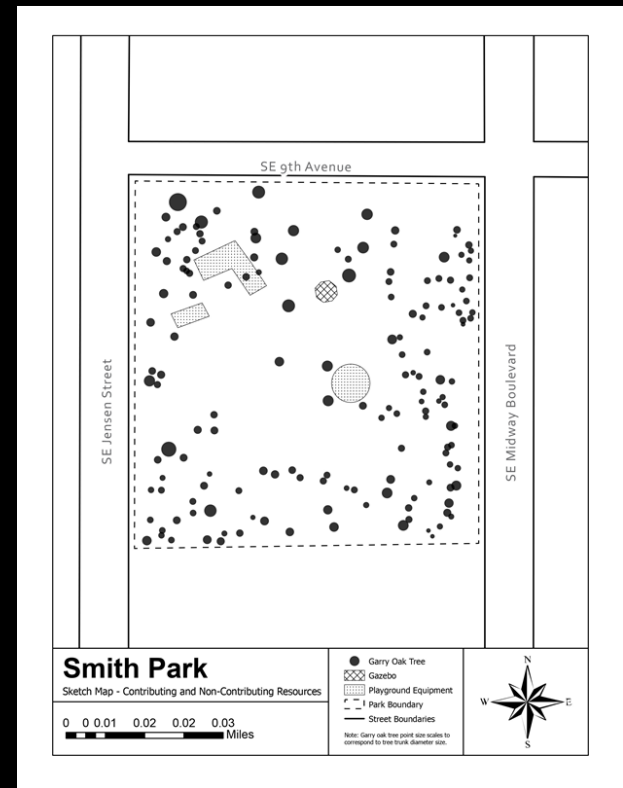

Yakima Valley Pinoys to Open New Clubhouse

Filipinos of Yakima Valley are mighty proud these days, proud of that monument to their years of unceasing effort—a center for the activities of their fast-growing Filipino Community.

For on March 22, the formal ceremonies celebrating the opening of their Community clubhouse will begin, attended by big officials of the town and county, and other friends of Filipinos in that vicinity. Philippine Consul Melquiades Ibanez will be one of the honored guests.

"Their clubhouse stands as a symbol of Filipino solidarity," Consul Ibanez commented in an interview for the FORUM.

"I am glad my countrymen in Central Washington are demonstrating that initiative and sustained effort to achieve something of which their posterity will justly be proud," the consul continued.

The clubhouse of the Filipino Community of Yakima Valley is established in the town of Wapato and was started in the first term of Roy Baldoz as president, who is also the present incumbent.

MODERN CLUBHOUSE READY FOR OCCUPANCY SOMETIME IN YEAR

WAPATO, Wash. — Resumption of work to finish the modern clubhouse for Filipinos in Wapato will proceed this summer, as funds already have been raised by popular subscriptions. Estimated cost of the building is \$40,000. The building will fill an urgent need for a larger social center and a meeting place in the Yakima Valley. When completed it will be the most modern and best of its kind in any Filipino community in the United States.

Value Increased
Real estate values in Wapato had increased. The lot which was purchased for \$1,000 years before was worth \$10,000 in 1945. A buyer wanted it for that amount in 1945. But community leaders made it known it was not for sale. In the meantime, the small building is serving as a meeting place for various groups other than Filipino. Four times a month it is rented to outsiders at \$10 a day.

Modest Start
The clubhouse is strictly a Filipino affair. There are no outside investors. It has had a modest beginning. When Filipinos in Wapato began to increase in number, they began to feel a need for a meeting place. Roy Baldoz, Harry Bussit, Eufemio Parel, and many other pioneers talked it over. The result was purchase of a lot which cost \$1,000. The amount was apportioned to those interested at \$10 a share, each buy-

NAVY HOSPITAL EXPANSION - O. K'D

The Navy Department has approved a \$105,600 project for the Seattle Naval Hospital, Senator Homer T. Bone announced today in Washington, D. C., the United Press reported.

The project will include new facilities and remodeling of buildings. Two other Puget Sound projects also have been approved by the Navy, Senator Bone announced. They are:

Barracks for 60 Waves at the Puget Sound Naval Hospital, \$100,000; additional facilities at Puget Sound Naval Depot, \$25,400.

A feature of the new constructions is the all-tile showers.

Church of All Creeds Opened At Sand Point

Dedication of the first interdenominational chapel to be authorized by the Navy in the continental United States was attended by 400 persons at the Seattle Naval Hospital grounds yesterday.

Capt. Joel T. Boone, medical officer in command of the hospital, gave the dedicatory address. Capt. F. C. Hill, Medical Corps, told of gifts given to the chapel, and Chaplain Oliver P. Zinnen expressed thanks in behalf of the Navy. Greetings were given by Capt. J. P. Forsander.

Among gifts to the chapel were electric organ, given by the Mothers' Club; an organ and electric curtains, donated by the Chapter, Knights of Columbus; an ark for Jewish service, a gift of B'Nai B'rith, and a collection by the hospital for furnishings.

BOAT TAKES TRIAL SPIN
Fishing Schooner Tordenskjold to Be
Operated on Halibut Banks.
 The schooner Tordenskjold, the latest addition to Seattle's fleet of fishing vessels, was given a trial spin on the bay yesterday, and proved herself to be all that her builders claimed for her. The **Tordenskjold** was built at the yards of John Strand, at Ballard, for N. B. Hegge, who will operate her in the halibut trade, fishing off the Vancouver island banks. The vessel is 74 feet long, 17.2 feet beam and 9.2 feet in depth. She will leave Seattle on her maiden voyage next Monday.

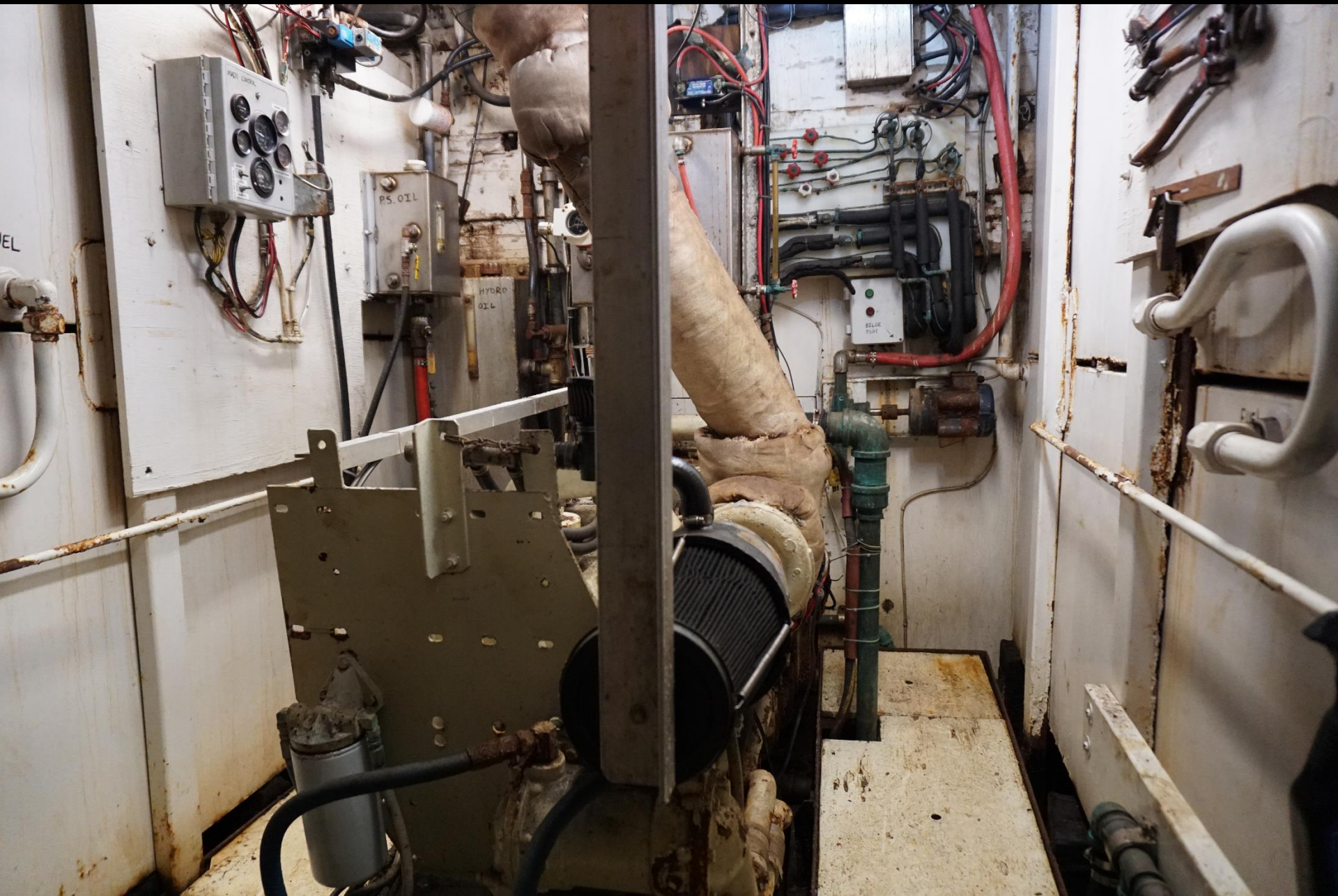

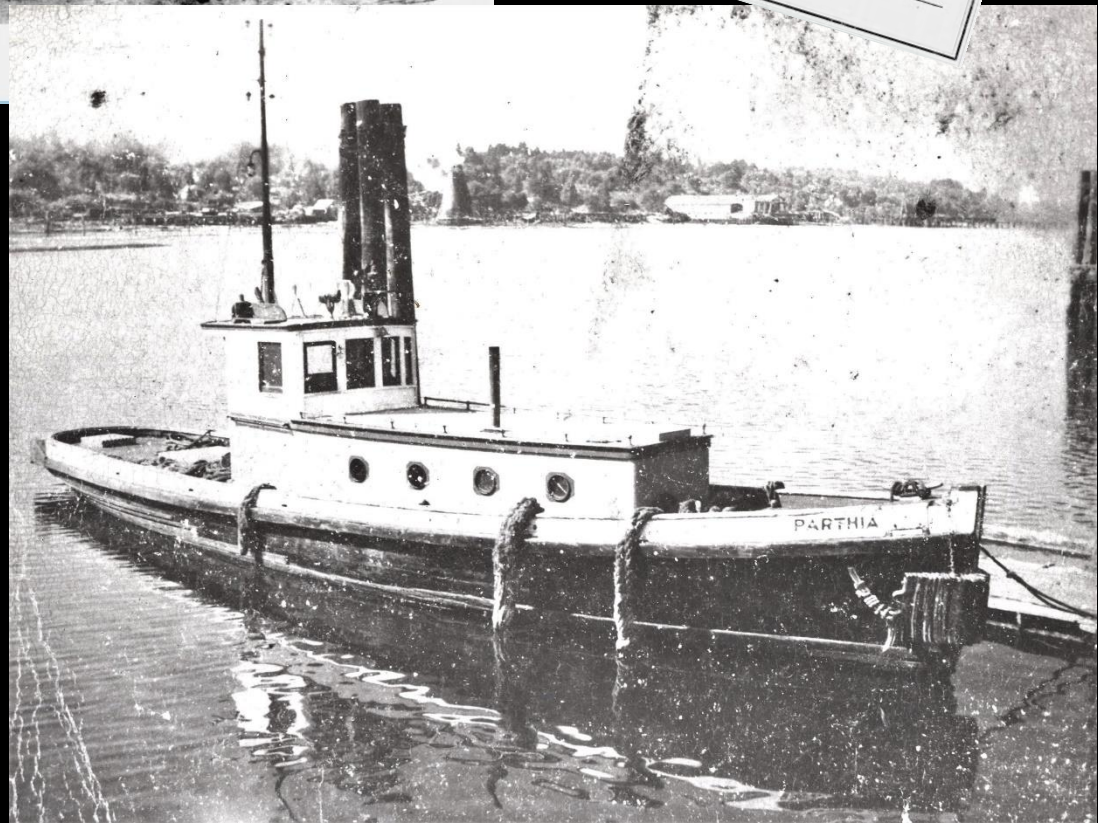
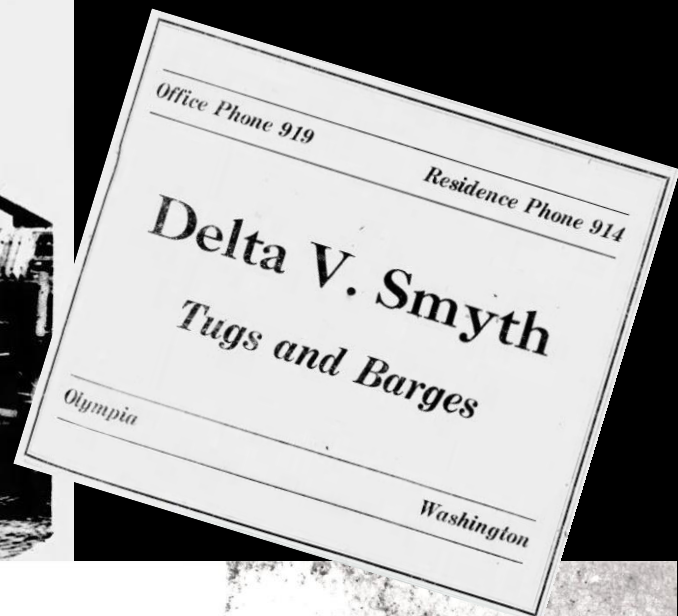

A view of the ten circular rearing ponds in Seward Park, Seattle park system, now operated by the Department of Game on subsidy from the Seattle Park Board. These ten ponds are fine examples of what cooperation can do. Seattle Outdoor Sports Council raised the initial moneys through a huge dance honoring the mayor-elect. These funds, augmented by the park board, brought WPA moneys and labor into action. Operation of the completed plant was started in 1935. Department of Game biologist is conducting food experiments in these ponds. Steelhead, rainbow and cutthroat are being reared here for liberation in Lake Washington and neighboring streams.

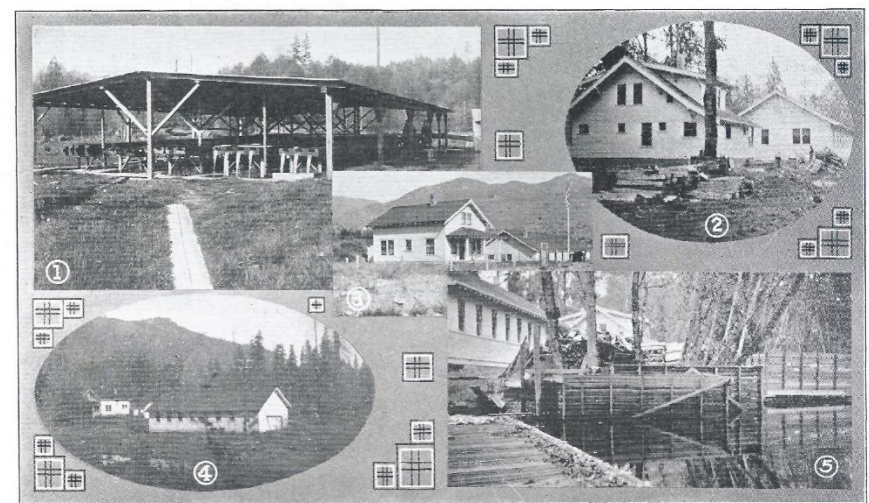

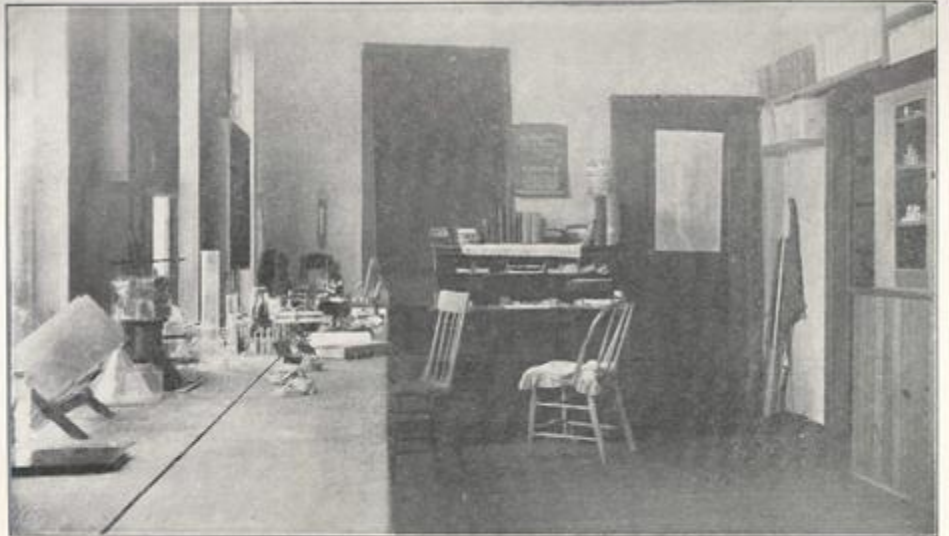

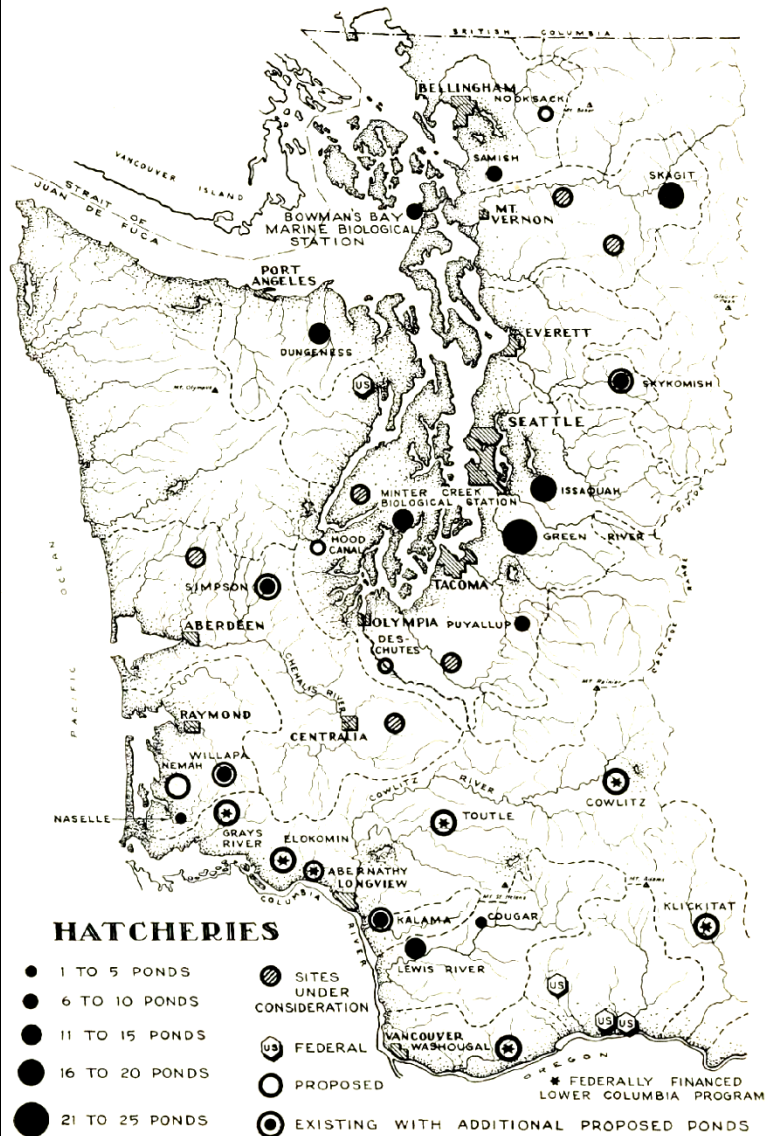

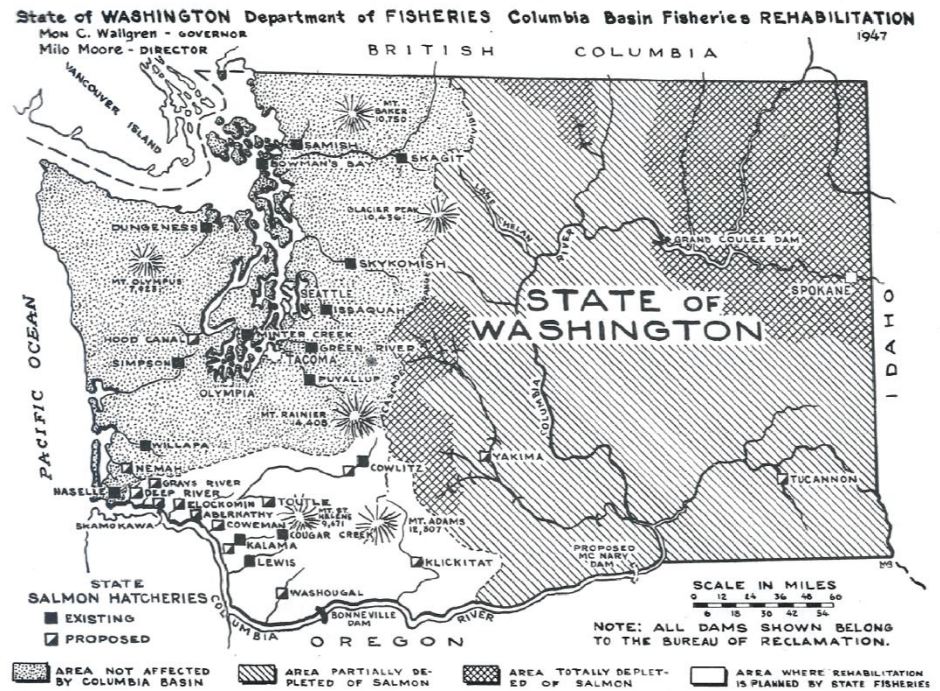

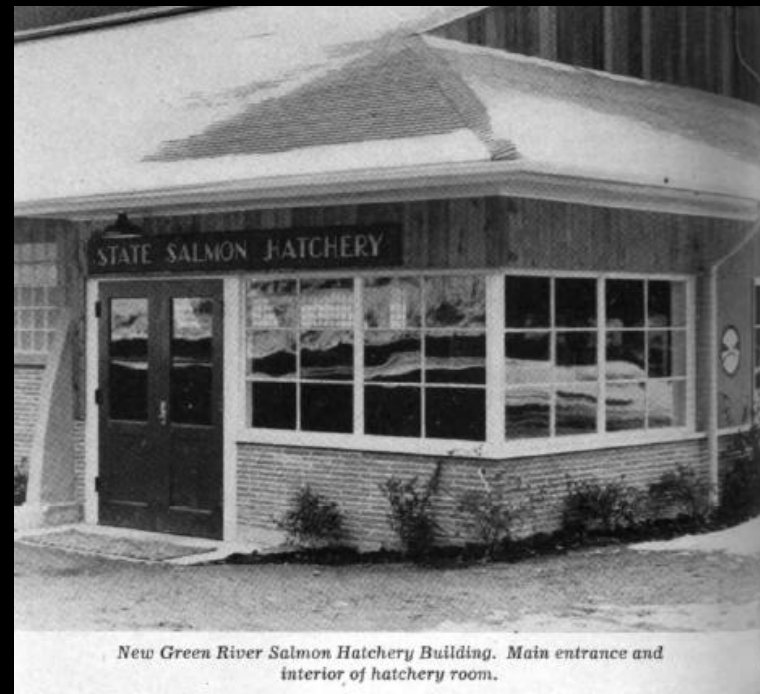


One of the new state hatcheries constructed in Pend Oreille County during 1922.

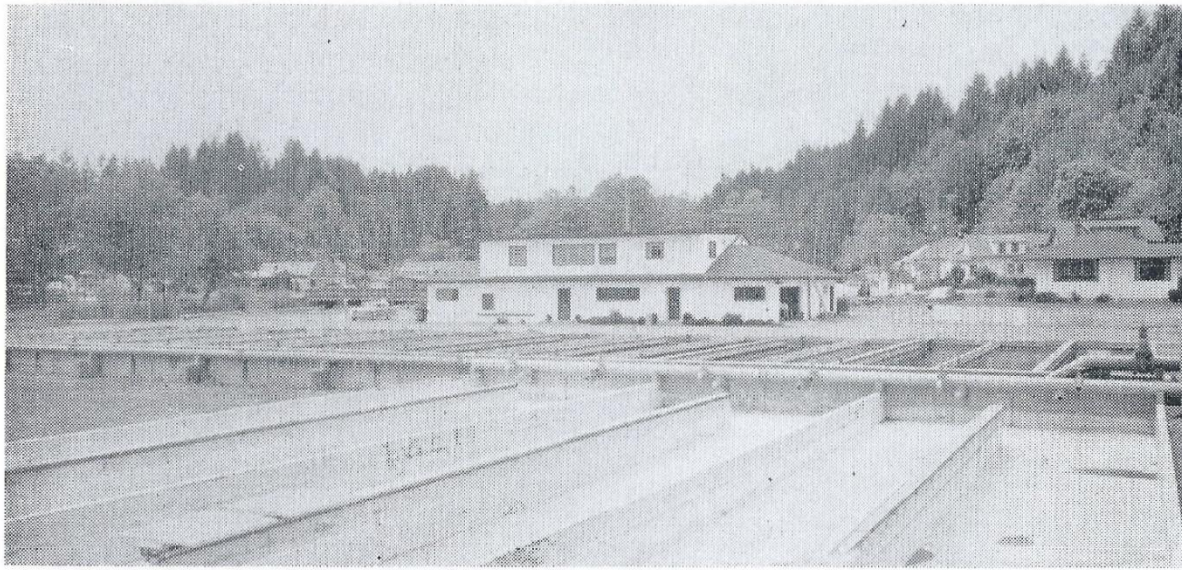

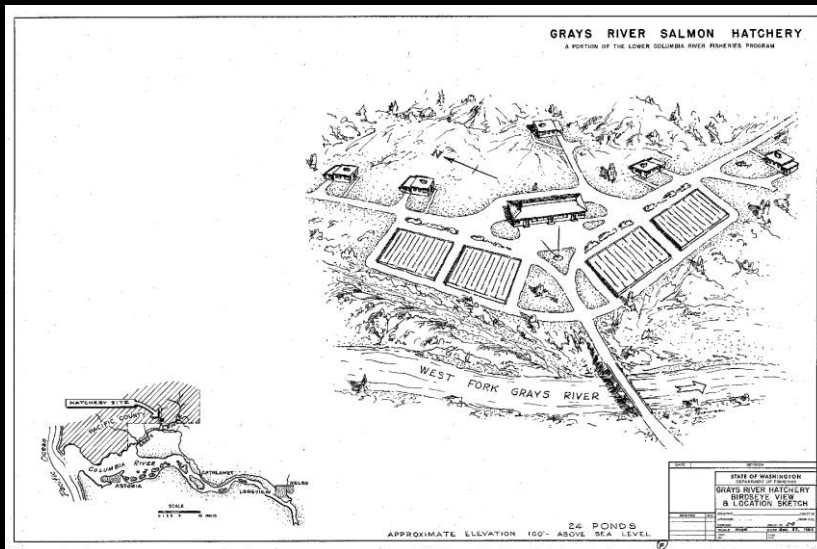

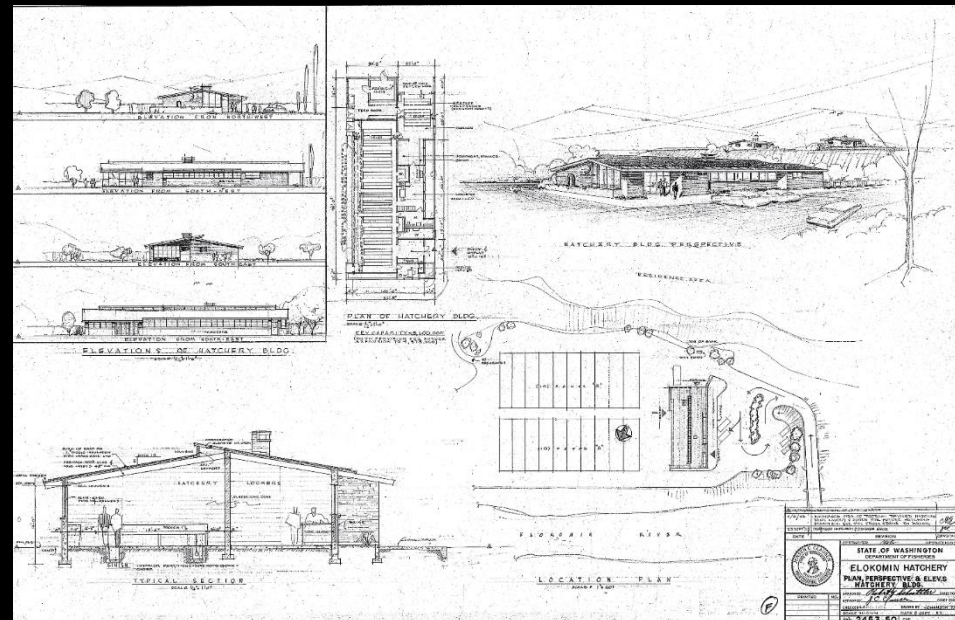

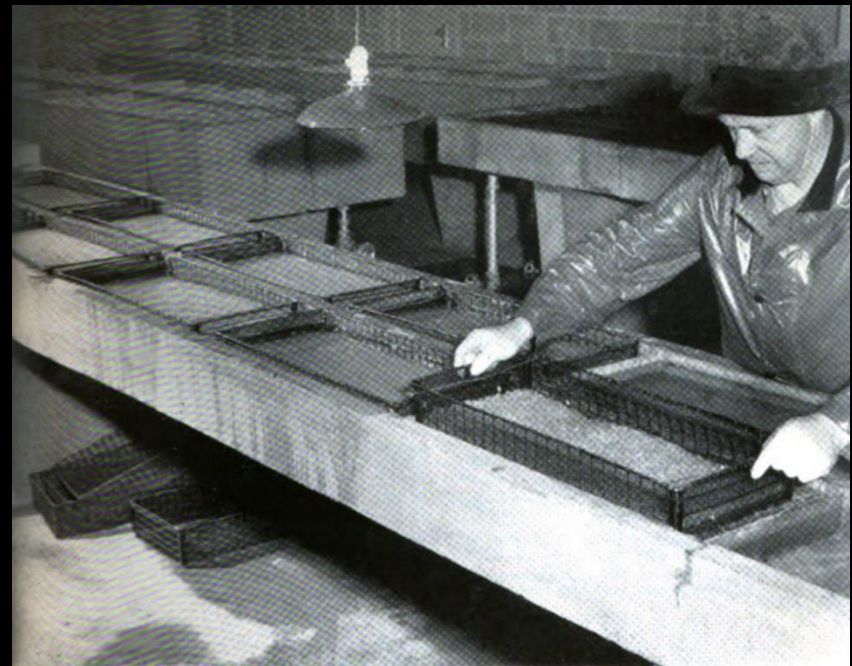

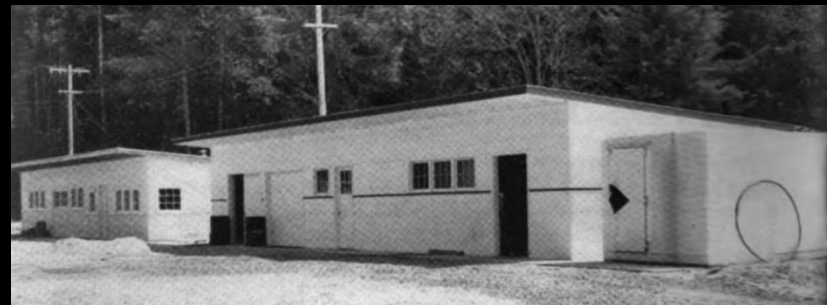
