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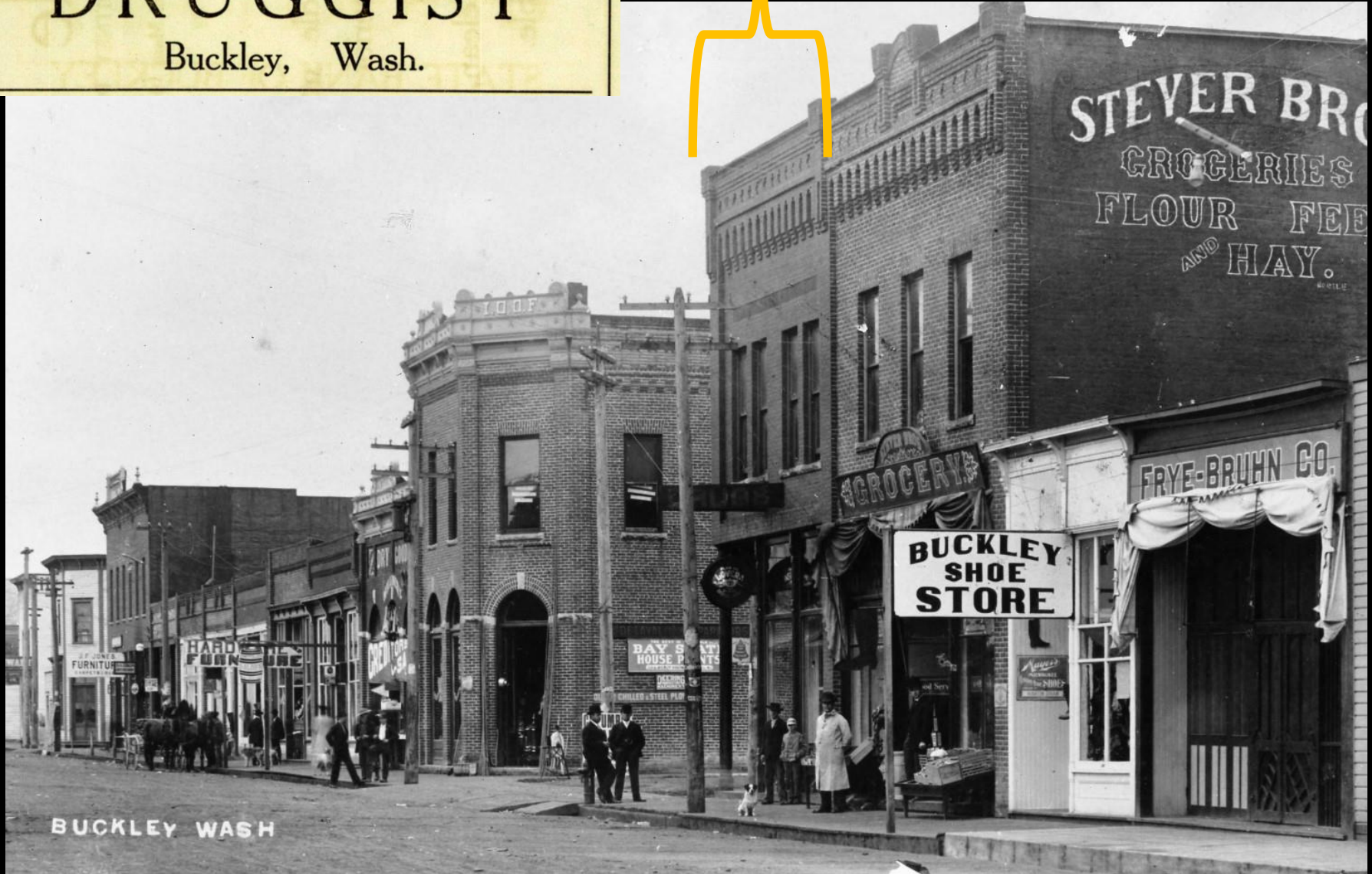

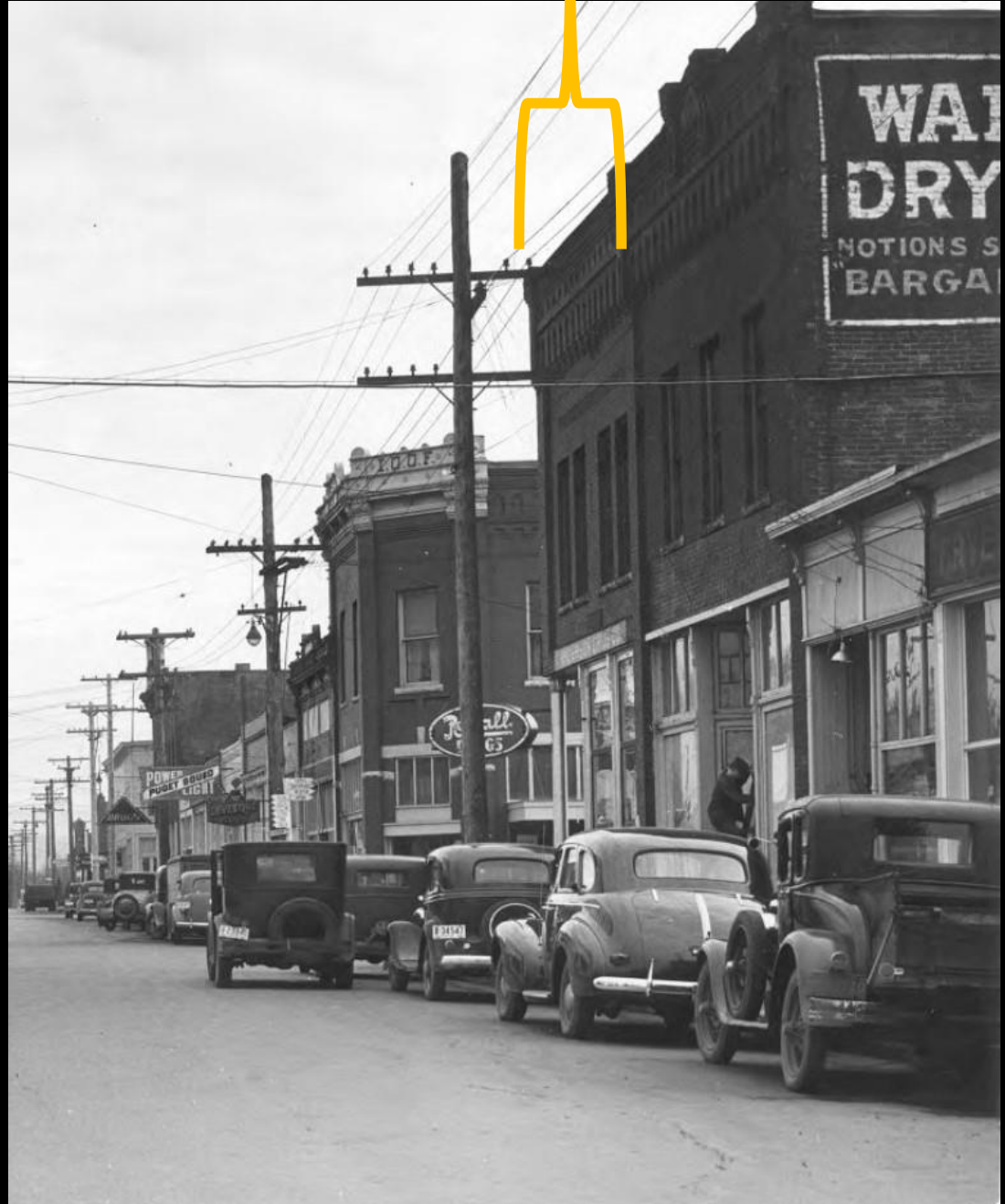

**COLORED WOMEN'S CLUBS
FORM CITY FEDERATION**

Formation of a City Federation of Colored Women's Clubs was effected Tuesday afternoon at the African Methodist church by eight clubs through their Presidents' Assembly. Officers of the federation are: President, Mrs. Dolly Vanderhost; vice president, Mrs. Virginia Spencer; secretary, Mrs. Nettie J. Asberry; treasurer, Mrs. E. M. Hallowell; executive board, Mrs. Oscar Arnette, Miss Lydia Spencer, Mrs. S. J. Collins and Mrs. Ella Kellum.

Through the agency of the City Federation, the colored women will lay plans for the entertainment of the state convention of Colored Women's Clubs of Washington and its jurisdiction to be held in Tacoma June 29-July 1.

The City Federation came about upon the suggestion of the Clover Leaf Art Club, the oldest federated club of the Washington jurisdiction, which was organized in 1909 to place a dismen at the Alaska-Yukon Pacific Exposition. Mrs. Nettie Asberry, founder of the Clover Leaf Art Club, called last November to the women's clubs in the city. The Presidents' Council was formed at the Presidents' Assembly and officers of all the eight

COLORED WOMEN ORGANIZE A CLUB

Notable Movement Started in Tacoma for Self Improvement and Mutual Interest Among the Colored People—Beginning of State Organization Which Will Include Principal Cities of Washington.

The representative colored women of Tacoma have recently organized a woman's club, known as the Clover Leaf Art club. The object of the organization is to bring about a closer relationship and foster an interest in needlework and handicraft, give assistance to the unfortunate ones, and to bring about ultimately the formation of a state federation of colored women's clubs.

The president has outlined an arduous course for the ensuing year. A mothers' club, young people's alliance, book lovers' club and a musical club will be organized, and efforts will be made to form similar clubs in other cities of the state.

The Clover Leaf Art club meets each week at the homes of members during the afternoons. A business meeting is held once during the month. An evening social meeting is also given monthly.

The club has started under very favorable conditions, and hopes to make a success.

The following officers have been named: President, Mrs. H. J. Asberry; vice president, Mrs. Arthur Wright; secretary-treasurer, Mrs. Edmond Moore; art critic, Mrs. Hiram Moore; chairman of entertainment committee, Mrs. C. Vanderhost; chairman of good deeds committee, Mrs. A. Foley; chairman of art committee, Mrs. H. Moore; chairman of music committee, Mrs. H. J. Asberry.

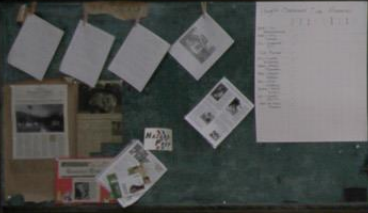

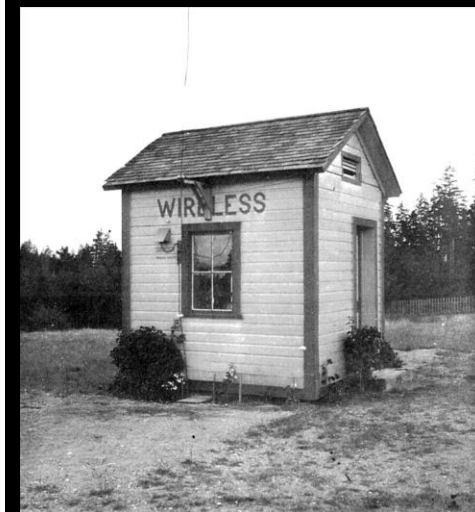

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PACIFIC RADIO NEWS

RADIO station 7YS holds the distinction of being one of the most efficient stations in the state of Washington. The station is owned and operated by Rev. Sebastian Ruth, of St. Martin's College, Lacey, Washington. Amateurs in California report good signals from 7YS. The best distance covered is Phoenix, Ariz. Rev. Ruth has often heard 6GQ, 6CC, 6BQ, 6BR, 6AT, 6CO, 6CS, 6FE, 6OH and others. A total number of 216 relay messages have been handled by 7YS since January 1, 1920. Weather reports are broadcasted every evening at nine o'clock on 375 meters.

The receiving equipment consists of a short and long wave regenerative receiver, equipped with honey-comb coils. A Murdock one kilowatt transformer is used for transmitting as well as a special type rotary gap, oil immersed condenser

and a large oscillation transformer. The aerial is of the "T" type, 100 feet high and 300 feet long. Stranded phosphor bronze wire is used throughout.

For long wave reception a single wire aerial, one-half mile long, is used. The radiation of the transmitter is six amperes on 375 meters.
