

Movies prompt obscenity petitions in Prosser

PROSSER — Outdoor movies described as obscene by the Prosser Ministerial Association and many Prosser residents are the subject of petitions circulating in churches, stores and offices here.

F. G. "Jerry" Johnson, Prosser businessman and former mayor, is spearheading the petition to determine "what is and what is not obscene."

The petition states that "The Supreme Court of the United States has said that in the matter of pornography and obscenity, local communities are to determine what is obscene. In Prosser, the limits beyond which public display is considered obscene have never been determined."

Several Prosser citizens objected to the movies described by them as "X-rated" but by Prosser Theaters as "R-rated or less."

The outdoor screen across the Yakima River on Wamba

Road, is in view of the homes along Riverside Drive where more than 15 children reside and can be seen as well by many other residents near and far away.

The Rev. Paul Jensen, president of the ministerial association, said "the viewing of such movies should be by choice and not by chance. . . and if X-rated movies must be shown let them be shown indoors where the attendance can be regulated by age and by choice."

"We took a stand because we felt a concern for the moral climate in the community and we should do something about it."

Jim Bonholzer, theater manager, said the Prosser Theaters "have not played any X-rated movies at the Prosser Drive-In since October 1974 at which time we decided X-rated movies were not needed as a drawing card."

Bonholzer said R-rated means "restricted to 17 and older."

"I play no shows that don't run in Seattle, Spokane or

California," said Bonholzer.

When questioned why he didn't show the R-rated movies inside at the Princess Theater he replied "people would much rather go to a drive-in than to get out of their car. . . and that he makes a lot more money at the drive-in than if shown inside. . . and that he provides no heaters for the cars."

Bonholzer said the attendance, mostly from Prosser and Grandview, has been good during the winter.

One nearby resident of the drive-in put up a stack of straw to block viewing of the screen from his house. It is reported that mothers complained that young people view the screen as they travel Highway 12 on their way home from school activities, while others park on private property outside the drive-in fence.

One party reported that complaints were registered with both the Benton County sheriff and prosecuting attorney and were informed that nothing could be done.

Mexicans enjoy Wild West films

PROSSER — Movies preferred by Mexican farmworkers are sur-

prisingly similar to the favorites of American audiences, the manager of Prosser's Spanish-language theater said.

Robert Rangel, a former migrant, said farmworkers flock to his Princess Theater when he shows John Wayne, Charles Bronson and Clint Eastwood films.

Although his distributing company sends him the films dubbed in Spanish, Rangel said he tries to get shows that are only subtitled, because the audience wants to hear the actual voices of the actors, even if they don't understand the words.

Movies with a lot of brawls and gunfights are most popular, Rangel said. But justice must triumph and the good guy wins in the end, he said.

The Spanish movie house is one of the few forms of entertainment available to Mexicans who can't speak English, Rangel said, because almost all Lower Valley restaurants, television and radio shows cater to English speakers. The Pasco theater at 517 W. Lewis also shows Spanish-language movies. The Princess is one

of an extensive network of Spanish-language theaters throughout the country, Rangel said. Many movies are made specifically for Mexican audiences in Los Angeles and Mexico City, he said.

Spanish-speaking actors that are virtually unknown to whites have devoted followings among Mexicans and Mexican-Americans in the Valley, he said.

Two of the most popular, he said, are Vicente Fernandez, as actor-singer, and Mario Moreno Cantinflas.

Cantinflas' comic portrayal of a Mexican policeman in "El Patrullero 777" made that film the most popular Rangel has ever shown, filling the theater to its 350 capacity on repeated return showings, he said.


