<b>Summary:</b>	Henry Bertelsen studied at the Chicago Institute of Fine Art. After finishing his work there, Bertelsen came to Spokane in 1905. He went to work as a draftsman for the architectural firm of Cutter & Malmgren, continuing to work for Cutter after Karl Malmgren left in 1917. When Cutter departed for California in 1923, Bertelsen took over what remained of the business in payment for back wages. Bertelsen continued to practice until his death in 1963. The collection consists of office correspondence, 1940-1954; financial and tax records, 1938-1948; and building specifications, 1927-1939. The Eastern Washington State Historical Society also has 150 sets of architectural drawings by Bertelsen.

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## Biographical Note

Born in Varde, Denmark in 1888, Henry C. Bertelsen arrived in Spokane, Washington in 1905. Before coming to this city he studied art at the Chicago Institute of Fine Art. In 1914, Bertelsen was chief draftsman for Kirkland Cutter in the design of the Davenport Hotel. Other Spokane buildings which he designed in whole or in part include the Spokane Coliseum, the Inland Automobile Association Buildings, the Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children, several buildings on the Gonzaga University campus and buildings for the Sisters of the Holy Names. All of these are noted in major sections of the inventory. Bertelsen was very prominent in charitable and civic projects, e.g., the Salvation Army, Booth Memorial Hospital and the Inland Automobile Association. He was a trustee of the Fairmont Cemetery Association, and a member of Our Savior Lutheran Church, Inland

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Empire Boy Scout Council, Rotary, Spokane Club, to mention but a few. He died on August 23, 1963 and was survived by his wife Alma G. Bertelsen, who lived to the age of 93 (1888-1981). She was secretary and receptionist at her husband's firm.

## Content Description

The bulk of the folios in the collection contain specifications, change orders, drawings and invoices which give a picture of the work of Bertelsen as an architect during and after WWII. In addition to this file Eastern Washington Historical Society has 150 sets of architectural drawings by Bertelsen.

## Holy Names College to Erect New Library

Holy Names College will begin its building program on its new campus with construction of a modern library, college officials announced Tuesday.

The library construction proposal was approved Tuesday at a meeting of the HNC Board of Regents at the college's new campus.

Sister Marian Raphael, HNC president, said construction is tentatively scheduled to begin early next spring.

"The recent move to the new campus at Ft. Wright has made the administration increasingly aware of the hardships imposed upon students by inadequate library quarters," Sister Marian Raphael added.

### First Step in Program

A modern, well planned library building was termed "the first step" in an overall building program at the new site. It is also regarded as "essential to the growth and success of the college."

Henry C. Bertelsen, Spokane, was approved by the board as architect for the project.

Final plans will await recommendations from Sister M. Frances of the Sacred Heart, HNC librarian. She left Tuesday on a week's inspection tour of recently completed college libraries in the Pacific Northwest.

Among the libraries scheduled for inspection are those at University of Puget Sound, Everett Junior College and Central Washington State College.

Merits of these and other modern college libraries will be used as a guide to determine the type of construction for the new HNC library, officials said.

Construction plans for a new dining center are also under consideration but are temporarily being held in abeyance, Sister Marian Raphael said.

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

## CITY AUDITORIUM PLANS RENEWED

**Charles Finucane Named Head of Civic Support Group.**

Charles C. Finucane was named general chairman to head a committee of all interested civic groups to formulate plans and coordinate community efforts toward erection of Spokane's proposed Memorial auditorium at a meeting Tuesday of the Memorial auditorium committee at the Davenport. The session was attended by nearly 40 civic leaders.

His selection was made by a nominating committee composed of Joseph Drumheller, chairman; Albert Leslie, Joseph M. Tewinkel, Ray Beil, and Harold Cassill.

Harold C. Whitehouse, of the Whitehouse & Price architectural firm which prepared plans for the structure, reviewed its facilities in detail.

To be located on the south side of Boone between Lincoln and Howard, the building would be within a 10-minute walk from the city center. Ten thousand persons could be seated in the arena and 3000 in the auditorium.

The arena would have a removable wood floor, easily removed from a concrete base that could be flooded for ice skating or used for auto and stock shows and other purposes.

Opening the meeting, E. S. Hennessey, chairman of the Spokane Memorial auditorium committee, which has been functioning for four and one-half years, recounted the last election when a bond issue for the project was defeated by 1600 votes.

**Need Realized.**

the 'bugs' that have developed in other auditoriums over the nation by following the recommendations of the special committee that was brought here from the east to study the problem."

As to safety provisions, he said there would be ample exits to empty the building in "three to four minutes."

"The shape of the auditorium has been approved by acoustical experts. Space has been provided in the arena, including that under the bleachers, for the display of all kinds of exhibits.

"One end of the arena will have a raised platform for use of a band, and the other end will have an entrance large enough for a truck to drive in and unload exhibit material. The arena floor would be large enough for hockey, and refrigeration pipes would be built into the concrete floor.

### Parking Described.

Henry C. Bertelsen described parking facilities for the east end which would have space for 800 to 1000 cars.

Cost of the structure was discussed, but establishment of the exact figure was left for Mr. Finucane's committee to study. Mr. Hennessey's suggestion that perhaps the actual construction of the building could be delayed until more favorable building conditions prevailed was contested by Mr. Drumheller.

### Wants Groups Heard.

"Passage of the bond issue doesn't mean construction will start the next day," Mr. Hennessey said. "Judgment and common sense will be used by the city commissioners."

He believed a more favorable reaction would be gained by emphasizing this point. Mr. Drumheller did not agree.

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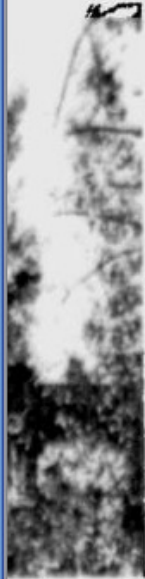

Donald E. Neraas, of the firm of Whitehouse and Price, noted that the Christian Science church was one which had important influences on other houses of worship constructed for that faith.

## COLISEUM FLOOR PLAN APPROVED
