JAMES E. BLACKWELL

Funeral services for James E.
Blackwell, 83 years old, a Seattle
architect the past forty years, who
died suddenly yesterday forenoon,
will be held at 1 o'clock Saturday
at the Bonney-Watson Funeral
Home.

Mr. Blackwell, a resident of
Washington nearly fifty years, was
one of the architects who designed
the first drydock at the Puget
Sound Navy Yard in Bremerton.
After coming to Seattle he designed
the Shafer Building, the Mutual
Life Building, Colman Dock and
nearly two hundred other struc-
tures in the city, as well as the
Northern State Hospital at Sedro
Woolley.

The veteran architect was a resi-
dent engineer for the United States
Shipping Board from 1918 to 1920
and two years later became super-
intendent of buildings here. He also
was a member of the city Board
of Public Works and the Zoning
Commission.

Mr. Blackwell was born in Fau-
quier County, Va. Surviving are
his widow, Eleanor, at the family
home, 1112 Harvard Ave. N., and
two daughters, Lenore, Seattle, and
Mrs. Frank Talbott, of Maryland.
