P. T. VAN NESS HAS JUST OCCUPIED RIGHT HOME TWO STORY HOME.

### SWISS ARCHITECTURE STYLE

P. T. Van Ness' eight room house, at 1824 Twelfth avenue, which has just been completed and occupied, is one of the handsomest two story dwellings in that vicinity. The architecture is Swiss style, with a veranda extending the full length of the front.

Outside the second story is finished with shingles, stained brown. The roof has four gables, and the extended eaves are supported by brackets free from the sides of the wall. The second story is finished in shingles, stained brown, and the first story in shingles of the same color. The window

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and porch trimmings are painted white, while the exterior is tan and brown siding. The veranda roof is painted dark red. It is supported by four square pillars, painted white.

Large square pillars, painted in black cement, makes up the foundation, which is four feet above grade. Several large forest trees add to the attractiveness of the grounds.

#### First Floor Arrangement.

Inside, on the first floor, there are four rooms, besides the pantry, hall and lavatory, in which there is a toilet. The entrance to the laundry is in the hall. The large hall is entered through a vestibule, with a seat and hall tree combined. The first state landing is reached by a short set of stairs. Both the steps and railing are stained dark. The large living room is entered from the hall, through a pocket door. The ceiling is paneled and square beam overhead. There is a large mantel in blue tiling in the living room, and three windows grouped together in front, well mike the room both artistic and well lighted. Between the living room and the dining room is a small hall. The dining room is entered from a pocket door, the ceiling being stained dark, the latter having a plate rail extending around the walls.

#### Dining Room.

The plastering in the hall and living room is pale yellow, and is well lighted by green glass. The door is finished in early gr. with pumpkin pine walls and leaded glass high windows. The ceiling is paneled, with recessed lighting and white smooth plastering above. The woodwork is painted white. Between the kitchen and dining room is a pocket door, also painted white. The floors throughout the house are native color fir.

There are four bed chambers above, and each bedroom has a fireplace. Each chamber has a large closet, with windows. The bathroom has a washbasin of imitation tile, and a separate shower.


There is a full basement under the house 7-1/2 feet high, equipped with a laundry. The house is heated by furnace, and electrically lighted throughout, a switch being in each room. Alfred Jones was the architect. The house cost \$3500.
