Definition of Heritage Barn

Section (5) "Heritage Barn" means any large agricultural outbuilding used to house animals, crops, or farm equipment, that is over fifty years old and has been determined by the department to:

(a) Be eligible for listing on the Washington Heritage Register or the National Register of Historic Places; or (b) have been listed on a local historic register and approved by the advisory council.

In addition to barns, "heritage barn" includes agricultural resources such as milk houses, sheds, silos, or other outbuildings, that are historically associated with the working life of the farm or ranch, if these outbuildings are on the same property as a heritage barn.

Analysis: No coverage/listings in important agricultural areas of the state. Greatly undervalued and under studied resource type.



Agricultural/Subsistence Historic Property Inventory Database

212 resources with Agriculture/Subsistence as <u>Current</u> Use 311 resources with Agriculture/Subsistence as Historic Use

Total listings in database – 45,032

Analysis: Appears as VERY under surveyed resource type. However, complete data evaluation unclear due to lack of information for 30,000+ legacy records.





ACTION PLAN: Conduct targeted inventory of resource type. Encourage listings of agriculture properties to historic register.

Could Your Barn Qualify for Historical Designation?

The era of wood barns ended more than 50 years ago. How can we preserve outstanding surviving examples? One way is to seek recognition for them by listing them on the State Register or National Register of Historic Places. Here in Washington State, to date, just 28 barns have been listed either individually or as part of a complex. (click here to see list)

While every barn is significant for the families and communities that value them, to be considered significant under National Register criteria, barns must be associated with important events and/or persons, or could be representative as an examples of their type, period or method of construction. For instance a barn might suggest a turning point in the way builders constructed barns or it may be a structure that represents the way farmers used their barns.

Most important however is that a barn should retained its original materials and appearance from the time of its importance. Generally the replacement of an original cedar shingle roof with standing seem metal, does not disqualify a barn from listing. Changes in window and door openings, as well as newer siding and additions may disqualify a property from listing.

To know if a particular barn might be eligible for consideration, you might ask the following general questions as a starting point:

- 1. Is the barn old (built before 1950)?
- 2. Is the barn exceptionally large (over 40 feet wide and over 60 feet long, not counting
- 3. Was it built with unusual building materials, or common materials?
- 4. Is it an unusual shape (not rectangular or L-shaped, but square, octagon, round, or Ushaped), or is it common?
- 5. Was the barn the site where the first of a new breed of cattle or other livestock was introduced in this region or state?
- 6. Did an important event (such as a farm protest meeting) take place there?
- 7. Did an eminent agriculturist work there?
- 8. Was the barn publicized as a model for new barn equipment, prefabrication, or innovative construction techniques?
- 9. Was it built in accord with blueprint plans that still survive?
- 10. Is the barn an example of a design that was featured in a particular sub region or area?
- 11. Was the barn built by a known master barn builder?
- 12. Does the barn have an unusual design (architectural form, decoration, embellishments).
- 13. Does the property have other structures such as a dwelling, silo, outhouse, chicken
