


The town of Bellingham was incorporated in 1903, the result of the consolidation of various settlements that formed around Bellingham Bay in the 1850s.





Construction began in 1892 on the City Hall for the recently consolidated town of New Whatcom.


The building remained City Hall for the town of Bellingham from 1903-1939.





The big bus that started Whatcom county Japanese on their way to the Tule Lake assemble center in Northern California Wednesday received many of its passengers at the Kenzo Okubo residence, 1406 H, street. There several families had assembled their personal effects. The photograph shows the first of them boarding there several lamines had assembled their personal criters. 



Built in 1927, the Mount Baker Theatre was part of a "Metropolitan District" in downtown Bellingham.







Interior views of the Mount Baker Theatre, built in 1927.




Built in 1895 the Fischer Block was originally home to the Owl Pharmacy and was known for years as the "Medical Building."






The theater was demolished in 1959 to make way for J.C. Penney's new building.






The Red Front Building at the corner of Holly and "Canoe" (Commercial Street) dates from 1900.

Built in 1914, the Liberty Theater




The Grand Theater was built in 1912 and demolished with neighboring buildings in 1971.
