



Founded in 1983, the **Chicken Soup Brigade** was an early AIDS support organization that provided meals and support to those living with AIDS. It is still in operation today, but operations have expanded to include food delivery and support to seniors and people with medical conditions other than AIDS.

AIDS/KS Support Group — Project of the Chicken Soup Brigade, 322-2873, Tom Frazier; 329-6609, Stan Henry. Geared specifically to the needs of persons with AIDS/KS. Offered on an ongoing weekly basis at a 1501 Belmont Avenue. Open to members only, by referral.

Chicken Soup Brigade — P.O. Box 20066, Seattle, WA 98102, 322-2873. A project of the Seattle Gay Clinic. Provides short and long-term support services to the ill and house-bound, including persons with AIDS (help with chores, grocery shopping, transportation, etc.).



The Florence Theatre, which opened around 1920, was a typical movie house of the era. In the late 1960s it was renamed the New Paris, a burlesque theater, that served gay and lesbian patrons. Noted as the last true Burlesque show in the city when it closed in 1977.


