
Cultural Resource Management Archaeology Field School 2017 at Iceberg Point, San Juan Islands National Monument, Washington Department of Anthropology and Museum Studies, Central Washington University





THE PLACE: is a salt water, maritime setting on Lopez Island, Washington. A very popular hiking location, Iceberg Point is part of the San Juan Islands National Monument managed by the Bureau of Land Management: https://www.blm.gov/or/resources/recreation/sanjuans/. The field school base camp will be at Lopez Island School, located a short drive from our field site location.

THE SCHOOL: Our work will focus on identifying and inventorying archaeological resources in a 100-acre area at Iceberg Point. Previous archaeology in the area has identified numerous archaeological sites of varying kinds and sizes. Our efforts will focus on pedestrian survey and limited shovel probes where surface vegetation obscures what lies beneath the surface. The Iceberg Point landscape was used in the precontact and contact era for a variety of activities like plant collection and processing, salmon processing, shell fish gathering, and fiber arts.

HOUSING: Lopez Island School will provide tent spaces on campus, with flush toilets and showers; there is no student charge for these.

COURSE COSTS: Food will be served in 3 meals a day plus snacks, M to F. Weekends are on your own, although some arrangements can be made. The cost for 3 weeks is \$350 for each student. There will also be a travel fee of \$110 for each student that signs up to cover costs of field trips and travel to and from the site.

ENROLLMENT LIMIT and APPLICATION DEADLINE:

There is a limit of 15 student slots. The application deadline April 2, 2017 or until 15 student field school positions are filled.

SKILLS: All students will be trained in pedestrian survey techniques, including topographic map reading and orienteering, shovel probe excavation and screening techniques, including sediment descriptions, basic artifact analysis and cataloguing, and stone tool analysis. Each student will keep a log book that will become a permanent record of the project. The goal of the field school is to provide you with enough training to get your first job in CRM archaeology.

DATES & CREDITS: Two courses must be taken concurrently for a 12-credit load July 10-July 29, 2017 Monday through Friday, 7 am to 3:30 pm; weekday evenings will involve talks and lab work.
